LOW RAILWAY FARES FOR THE HOLIDAYS. Special low fares with generous time limits for the return trip will be available on Canadian railroads for the Christmas and New Year Holiday periods. It was announced today by C. P. Hildell, Chairman of the Canadian Passenger Association, that the low rate tickets will be good between all stations in Canada and also between Canadian points and certain United States destinations.

Tickets for the return journey will be sold at the ordinary one-way rate plus one cent. These will be good for the going journey from Thursday, December 21st, to Monday, January 1st, inclusive; and to Monday, January 1st, inclusive; and to Monday, January 1st, inclusive.

Work will be proceeded with in constructing the middle road from Hurontario St. to Port Credit, Oakville, Ont. Leopold Macaulay, Minister of Highways, announces, including construction of a bridge over the Credit River and the Cloverleaf bridge, the cost of this six miles of highway.

Five hundred men are expected to be employed in grading, etc., while an additional hundred are expected to be employed on the highway. The cost of this six miles of highway will cost about \$400,000. The route to be followed through Peel and Halton counties will be on the Toronto and Credit River road to Sheridan, then diagonally to Lower Middle road to a point one and one-half miles east of Oakville, then westerly along the Lower Middle road to a point striking the north limits of the town of Oakville. The route of the highway from Oakville to Burlington has yet to be established.

"Ottawa Spotlight"

Ottawa, Nov. 28th.—The poor consumer gets it in the neck both counting and going during the fluctuations of foreign exchange. When the British pound was down below four dollars, most of the advantage of buying British goods was nullified by the currency dump duty against British goods. Now the pound has gone up to 530 or so, making it even more expensive at times the falling American dollar brought some relief to the importer by giving him a chance to buy the American dollar for 50 cents instead of 120.

I suppose the reason the customs department stepped in with a dump duty on American goods is that the public of course, feels the bit. Those who can contract shipping out of the most gloomy circumstances will probably say that in any event the Canadian dollar is a better bet than the American dollar. That is true, except for what goes into the pockets of domestic manufacturers, many of which are owned in other countries.

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Ever since the prime minister made that radio speech in which he announced a program of public works from coast to coast beginning next spring, the boys up on the hill have been asking themselves if that means an election next fall. If employment is to be given to a few hundred thousand people, directly or indirectly it would be the best election propaganda since the G.O.P. party could hope to get out. Of course there were a few strings tied to the promise.

Well, evidently next spring the Ottawa building scheme will be revived, but so will lots of others. All the depressing public works that have been cancelled are not? Will there be a post office, a wharf, or a customs post, preferably.

Is it inflation? Well, it's the issuing of new paper bills without any new assets behind them. But it's perfectly legal and proper and it has the blessing of the financial pundits. We must think that our notes have not been backed by 60 per cent gold, but the modern notion is that 25% is quite enough. We have enough gold in the vaults at Ottawa to justify a further printing of 100 millions of notes. That's the picture.

Personally I have never been able to see a great difference between issuing promises to pay in the form of bonds, which bear interest, and promises to pay in the form of notes, which don't bear interest, except that there is a natural check on the former and none on the latter. It all depends on how they handle things.

Chief Long of the Fire Brigade spoke briefly regarding the operation of that department during the year. There is perfect harmony in the Brigade and the members appreciate what the Council has done.

Dr. McAndrew, who was nominated as Councillor for Ward Three, said he had been a ratepayer for thirty years and every year the taxes were going up. The cost of education was too much and more economy should be practiced in every department of the town. Industries should employ residents of the town and those who earn their money in town should spend it here. It was time the town's rate was being reduced. There was really no surplus as presented in the statement and the assets were very defective.

Councillor Speight extended an invitation to the Doctor to accept a position in the Council and help straighten matters out.

E. R. Maglother, President of the Lorne Hites (Scottish) Band, asked the ratepayers to support the band in the assessment to pay the Bandmaster's salary. The band has supplied entertainment for the citizens and employees anxious to carry on and he hoped the ratepayers would grant their request.

The meeting closed with the National Anthem. The interim financial statement as presented to the ratepayers appears on page 4 of this issue.
