Ottawa, December 5th.—There is only one way for Canadian exporters and importers of intoxicating beverages in the quota scheme which "Woo America" will place into effect for foreign cargoes. The years taken as the basis for the size of various national quotas, namely, 1910-1914, were years in which Canadian shipments were not important.

There will be a tendency to criticize the W. W. L. Heritage, Canadian minister to Washington, for the unimportant character of the quota plan announced by President Hoover. The recent Canadian action has not been a failure to date. Minister Eggleston, however, has decided to apply a current duty to American products which will have been in effect since the war.

It is not so much that people here are considering what would happen if the tariff were to be raised, but that they are afraid that the duty will be applied to American products which will have been in effect since the war.
