"Our municipalities," he went on, "borrow money at 7 per cent. from the banks, they give as security the taxes they levy on the public. The banks go to the government with this money and the government, at 3 per cent. so the taxpayer actually gives the banks 4 per cent. for negotiating a loan for the government. Why can't the government lend the money direct to the municipalities, and save the 4 per cent. on our public debt?"
Mr. Plank's address was followed by a heated discussion in which the meeting decided from figures on hand that the government could make money lending to municipalities at 1 per cent. and interest in unannounced favor of a central bank which "should not be run with a mercenary object but rather as a public service."
