

The chief value of roots as a poultry feed lies in the fact that they can be stored during the winter months, and fed over the period during which fresh green feeds are not available. They should not be considered in any way as a complete substitute for fresh green feeds, chiefly because they are quite deficient in vitamin content. The anti-neuritic and anti-accorbutio vitamins are present in only the alightest traces, while the anti-rachitic vitamin is entirely lacking. In comparison, fresh clover, one of the most commonly used green feeds contains all three in abundance. The chief function of mangels and roots in general is the supplying of succulence to the ration. It has been found that by using mangels and aupplementing the sunters with the hirds for their voice. 
