Canada Gets Most Water From Niagara's Supply

Niagara falls is not controlled by Canada. However, a treaty was signed by the United States and Canada providing for the construction of the amount of water which may be diverted for industrial purposes, the maximum to 2000 cubic feet per second on the American side and 1000 cubic feet per second on the Canadian side. This was done in order to preserve the scenic beauty of the falls and also to maintain lake levels. The amount of water in these limited amounts is due to the manner in which the water is withdrawn.

Planetarium Is Theater That Reveals Astronomy

A planetarium is an auditorium covered by a ceiling which is hemispherical in shape. On the ceiling, which is fixed from the walls like an inverted bowl, the various constellations of the sky are thrown by a machine which registers with graphic clarity, mathematical precision and scientific accuracy the positions and travels of the 2000 heavenly bodies visible to the naked eye.

Most Valuable Tapestry

After being lost for many years a tapestry, declared to be the most valuable in France, was found in a dusty closet in the Church of St. Eustache, one of the largest churches in Paris. The discovery was the result of following up an old legend, long held in ecclesiastical circles, that a very valuable work of art in the form of cloth was hidden in one of the Paris churches. A number of churches were searched, and finally, in a forgotten cupboard high up in the sacristy of St. Eustache, the tapestry was discovered. The tapestry which is on view at the church, has the four corners adorned with palms. The outer edge is in linen, and the inner edge has clusters of roses.

Rome's Colosseum

The Colosseum in Rome was begun by Vespasian on the site of part of Nero's famous Golden House, and inaugurated by Titus in A.D. 80. It contained originally of three arched stories of stone and an upper gallery, originally of wood, which was rebuilt of stone in the present form sometime in the Third century. The Colosseum probably seat between 40,000 and 50,000 people. It is elliptical in plan, with its long axis 615 feet and its short axis 510 feet; its area, 211 feet square and 177 feet to the top of the highest to the top of the Third century stone screen wall is about 160 feet.

"Faggot"

"Faggot," an English term, is a system used in English public schools under which, generally with the full approval of the authorities, a junior boy performs certain menial duties for a senior. Until recent years the faggot was a boy of such humble tasks as blacking boots, brushing clothes, cooking breakfasts, and there was no limit as to hours. Faggotting is restricted to such light tasks as running errands, bringing tea to the master's study, sweeping and tidying the study, and outfielding in cricket or football.

The Lido in Italy

Italy's noted bathing beach, the Lido, lies but a short distance from the heart of Venice, and without the chain of low sand islands the Venice of today would have been but a town. It was in the Fifth century A. D. that German barbarians swept down over Italy and inhabitants of the mainland sought refuge on the Lido, but the ease with which these islands could be attacked by enemy navies led to an exodus in 800 to the present site of Venice which lies between Lido and the mainland.

Inventions
