Rome's Colossous The Colossoms in Rome was begun by Vennasian on the site of part of Nere's famous Golden House, and inangurated by Titus in A.D. 80. It conshited originally of three arcaded stories of stone and an upper gallery. eriginally of wood, which was rebuilt of stone in the present form sometime in the Third century. The Colosseum probably seated between 40,000 and 50,000 people. It is elliptical in plan. with its long axis 615 feet and its short axis 510 feet; Its arens, 281 feet long and 177 feet wide. Its total baight to the top of the Third century stone screen wall is about 160 feet.
