The Pebruary meeting of the W.O. T.U. was held at the home of Mrs A. J. O'Nelli. Priday afternoon last. Mrs. W. J. Marshall, presiding. Following the devotional period led by Miss Coventry and the discussion of several matters of business, Mrs. subject of 'Peace," in which the writer, extolling this God-like virtue, reminded us that peace is a positive thing, and that it is very necessary that we do not allow our desire for peace and tolerance to degenerate into a flabby non-resistance to evil, that we must not be overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good. As a result of experiments, he advises both those who have resolved at all odds to master the tobacco appellts for their physical and mental benefit and also those who are simply going to make a try at it to become vegetarians. He gives the experience of the editor of the London Ciarton, Eng. who testifies: "I was a heavy amoker for more than thirty years—I have been a vegetarian for eight weeks and find that my passion for tobacco b weakened. It does not taste the same. In remembrance of Frances E. Willard, who thirty-six years ago this month was called to "higher service."
