TOLD IN BRITAIN



News and Information For the Busy Farmer

International Plowing Match
The Plowmen's International Plowing Match and Farm Machinery Demonstration will be held on May 10th, at the Incorporated of York, Ontario, New York County, Westford Post Office, Ontario, a few miles outside the City of Toronto October 9, 10, and 11th, 1934.

In 1934 the first plowing Match was held in York County, near this farm.

Heavy Milling Costs

The damage done by marauding dogs to sheep flocks in Old Ontario has been estimated by the Provincial Game and Fish Commissioner, as at least \$30,000. This is the amount of money which municipalities throughout the province have had to pay out in compensation to sheep owners. Provincial and municipal regulations permit the farmer whose flock has been ravaged to apply for compensation and settlement of his claim by the government or through a provincial expert.

There is little that can be done to prevent such ungodly animals with their sharp claws and teeth from gaining access to the most tightly enclosed pens and pastures. They work at night, work noisily and leave only a short trail of blood behind.

Harrison, Ont., took one protective step when they passed a by-law last week requiring the owner of each dog to pay a fine of \$10 for the majority of slaughtered, from \$7 to \$17, hoping to reduce the number in the township.

Canadian Grain Successes

Information recently secured from the prize winners at the International Hay and Grain Show held at the Experimental Station at Ottawa, shows that in the hard red spring wheat class, the most important class in the show, all of the prizes were won with varieties of wheat developed and developed by the Dominion Experimental Station. These were thirty-eight awards in all. Twenty-eight exhibitors won first honors. The remaining ten were given second place awards with Clinton, Ontario, the proudest record of grain exhibition success maintained, and it is noteworthy, indeed, that the Dominion Experimental Station, which has concentrated so materially towards this outstanding triumph.

Marketing the British Market

The steady job of providing food for the British market depends upon supplying that market with what it requires and a regular supply of quality products. This is a task which is easily done in the case of meat, but it is probably not so much in the matter of quality, although there is still room for improvement, but more particularly in the matter of quantity. A country producing a surplus of farm products is a source of satisfaction to remember that there is still available a market which spends about \$1,000,000,000 a year.

Early Tomato Production

The best prices for tomatoes are paid for early, ripe fruit, but the grower must not make the mistake of growing the plants too close together.

The Dominion Horticultural recommends early sowing coupled with the use of early maturing good varieties.

The sowing should be made in the open ground, but well grown plants in boxes and ready for planting out at the sign of seedling weather.

Soil should rich in nitrogen, phosphorus, potassium, calcium, magnesium and a small amount of fruit.

Low temperatures, high phosphoric acid and a medium amount of potash are essential to good results.

The Farm Poultry Fleas

Poultry is at last definitely recognized as one of the essential departments of every up-to-date farm where a program of mixed farming is carried on. The Department of Agriculture and the Department of Farm Work but more and more farmers are coming to realize that for the capital invested in the farm, the labor involved in the farm, if properly conducted, will give a high return.

For the mixed farm general purpose breeds such as the Plymouth Rock, which are good both for market and for the production of market poultry, are recommended.

A flock of a hundred such birds fully managed are returning to many farms a net profit per year ranging from \$300 to \$500 per year, which is something not to be chidined by even the most successful farmer.

Reducing Farm Power Costs

Farm power costs may be reduced by using power instead of animal and implements on tractors, by using power hitches and operating with an optimum load. Horse labor costs may be reduced by better training and implements in perfect adjustment, by using proper hitches and loads by economical feedings and by using mostly young horses raised on the farm.

Drive on Warble Fly Planned in Ontario

All over Ontario farmers are taking steps to eliminate the Warble Fly, reported officials of the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, who are working with groups of live stock and an effort is being made which is now responsible for a loss of half a million dollars in hides alone and probably five times as much in retarding milk production.

After successfully demonstrating that warbles could be definitely controlled following the original project on Harris Island, Ontario, Canada, and the leadership of Dr. Lionel Stevenson, provincial zoologist, and the county agricultural representative, and by mid-June, 1933, the first meetings of the three annual treatments will be made.

A special powder, investigated and approved by the officials of the Canadian Co-operative Wool Growers, is the main ingredient which is responsible for a loss of half a million dollars in hides alone and probably five times as much in retarding milk production.

WHY DO BIRDS MIGRATE?

What makes birds go south in the autumn and north in the spring? Dr. William Rowan, of the University of Alberta, believes it is certain internal organs which are affected by sunlight. In spring the lengthening days and increasing temperature cause the internal organs to move into the northwest movement in autumn and the reverse.

To test his theory, Prof. Rowan turned loose several hundred crows in Medicine Hat, and after a few days he found that the birds had moved to the northwest, and became quite tame.

Already there is considerable talk of compulsory province-wide treatment similar to measures adopted in Denmark, where the warble fly has been almost eliminated. Some idea of the extent of the present campaign is indicated by the report that over 300,000 cattle are treated in the central and southern prairie provinces, where Agricultural Representative G. R. Green is in charge of organization. 60,000 head will be cleaned up, and in fact, one cow which had the Warble Fly, was treated.

During the summer months the cattle are about to the warble fly, as well as small stampedes, with much loss of meat or milk flow, are common.

The eggs hatch and grubs make their way into the body of the animal.

They bore into the body and consequently the fly, thus saving the hide and preventing further infestation in the summer. It is estimated that 100,000 cattle will clean up the past either on individual farms or in large districts.
