**CORRESPONDENCE****A DANGEROUS PRACTICE**

With your permission, I will draw

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**LOW COST OF HYDRO SERVICE**

In 1933, the last year for which  
comparative figures are available, all  
the domestic consumers served by  
Hydro municipalities used an average  
of 140,000 kilowatt-hours per family.  
At this rate the average cost, inclusive  
of all charges, of only 157  
cents per kilowatt-hour. According to  
the latest figures, the cost for 1934  
for the same class of consumer would  
be approximately 15 cents per kilowatt-hour.  
The domestic consumers served by  
Ontario Hydro paid an average of 580 cents per  
kilowatt-hour.

It is a simple matter to compute  
that if Ontario Hydro domestic con-  
sumers had had to pay, for the 1933  
rate, the cost of hydro-electric power  
as much per kilowatt-hour as  
United States consumers paid, their  
bills would have aggregated the vast  
sum of \$14,000,000 or nearly \$15,000,  
000 more than the total cost of hydro-  
electricity actually paid them under Hydro  
service.

It is also a simple matter to compute  
the achievement that the Hydro  
electric system has accomplished in reducing  
costs of hydro-electric power to the  
consumer as compared to costs paid  
by other hydro-electric systems. The  
difference in costs per kilowatt-hour  
is the tremendous quantity of  
electrical energy used by Ontario  
domestic consumers.

Even if it be recognized that the  
probable effect of attempting to  
charge in Ontario at the rates previ-  
ously mentioned would be to force  
Ontario Hydro consumers to pay twice  
as much electricity as they actually  
did under the low Hydro rates as  
now charged, the net revenue to the  
Ontario Hydro system would be  
approximately \$10,000,000 less than  
the amount of money saved by Ontario  
consumers.

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
