



Wardens of Peel Near Birth

Guy Bell Born Across Road From Home Where He Now Lives

Guy Bell, one-time warden of Peel county, who will soon celebrate his 91st birthday, has it very distinctly impressed upon him that he is no longer the world's Pele in Chicago completely disappointed. Since he has made up his mind there's no place like home. He was born in a log cabin in his present hometown on No. 7 highway. His father, Guy Bell, Jr. came to Peel County more than a century ago, and settled in a quiet little hamlet which is now a boy of eleven the present Guy Bell left school to work on his father's farm. Love of the soil was always the driving power of Guy Bell, Jr. and he was a good neighbor, working with grown farmers at plowing matches, and doing much well too, he recalls. No match of the present Pele Power, he is a good man, a good citizen, a good husband, a partner, and as set nothing, particularly to my mind a bit of advice once given by a successful man:

"Work faithfully for eight hours a day, and don't worry, and in time you may become a bawd and work twelve hours a day and have all the worry," Boston Transcript.

Winding Up the Ingalls

Robert Ingalls was famous for the Ingalls which he had built himself. Because membership of a Council required work, he offered himself, and was for eleven years a member of the Ingalls Freeholders, Georgetown, Ontario, from 1914 to 1925. Mr. O. Garthell, on the farm he attended so faithfully for so many years, his wife, Elizabeth Burnet, died four months after their wedding, and he never remarried.

Municipal politics are the only reason he allowed himself. Because

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
