"We dug and got the whole skeleton except the hands and feet bones, but the ribe broke into pisoss when we tried to move them. Later we found the other skelston about eight fest away. They were burried to the south of the Midland-Orillia highway near the dam and had their faces towards the old

Eight small blackened rings, which when cleaned, were found to be of gold, and a silver cross, about three inches in length with double arms were found with one skaleton, while a curious cupped bowl with a wooder bottom or lining and a smaller alleer cross was found with the other.

From the contour of the one skull Indian as the cheek bonce are wide and far apart. The other shull with which the rings and larger cross were found is as clearly that of a white man, probably a prisat. It is thought that the bonce are the remains of t Jesuit missionary and his Indian attendant and that the rings were wedcling rings to be used in marrying the Indians.
