### Unemployment Insurance and Minimum Wage for Men

I believe that unemployment is the primary cause of our present troubles. We have heard so many proposals of the cause of the present depression and so many suggested cures for it that it is not my intention to weary you with my views excepting insofar as they are necessary to explain the reasons for my stand on the question. Since the war labor-saving devices have increased tremendously by mass production of goods through labor-saving devices our manufacturers have reached the point where by working a six-day week more goods can be manufactured than the people of this country can buy with their present wages. Not more than they can use, but more than they can buy. This fact scarcely requires proof as it is taking place in all lines of production on the farm as well as in the factory. When this fact is admitted it then becomes obvious that we must either increase our buying power by increasing wages, or we must reduce working hours and working days. The present condition is not a temporary condition, it will not cure itself but if the facts are faced it can be cured.

I contend that everyone in this country is entitled to a decent living and a job with which to earn this living. EVERYONE IS ENTITLED TO THIS AS A MATTER OF COURSE. TO VOTE AS A MATTER OF COURSE. We are entitled to it because we are human beings, because we live in a Christian democracy. It is the first duty of our government to see that every man gets this right to live decently, which is the most important thing in a man's life. Employment can and should be regulated to the point where every man has a job and this should and can be done by legislation and then we should have contributory unemployment insurance to take care of contingencies. I do not believe in any "do-or-die" scheme of taking wealth from one man and giving it to another. There is gross injustice being done through the unequal distribution of wealth, but in my opinion the best way to cure this is to cure the evil which allowed the unequal accumulation of wealth. It is better to erect a barrier to prevent men from falling over a cliff than to supply an ambulance at the bottom of it. It is a crime to steal from your fellow men, but it seems that if you steal a large sum of money from the public generally, the reward is more apt to be a title than a prison. This should not be permitted. The law should apply equally to all men. The man who steals a million dollars or ten million dollars from his fellow men by watering the stock of a company or by a merger of companies, should be forced to make restitution and should be punished even though he is a magnate of industry or a bank president. I also believe that excess profits should be taxed. Any fair system of taxation is based upon a consideration of several things: citizenship, services received and ability to pay. Our municipal taxes are raised mostly upon assessment on real property. Why shouldn't excess profits be made contributory? When we elect millionaires as our premiers have they only ourselves to blame if we are unfairly taxed, such as the tax on sugar which makes twenty million dollars annually out of the pockets of people who can ill afford to pay and leaves the earnings of the wealthy practically untouched. I am in favour of legislation preventing the watering of stock, preventing the theft from the public by mergers of companies, and I am in favour of fair taxation of profits. If all of this is done the accumulation of wealth in a few hands to the detriment of the masses will be prevented.
