ment insurance to take care of contingencies. I do not believe in any "Robin Hood" scheme of taking wealth from one man and giving it to another. There is gross injustice being done through the inequal distribution of wealth, but in my opinion the best way to cure this is to cure the evils which allowed the inequal accumulation of wealth. It is better to creet a barrier to present men from erect a barrier to prevent men from falling over a cliff than to supply an ambulance at the bottom of it. It is a crime to steal from your fellow men, but it seems that if you steal a large enough sum from the public generally, the reward is more apt to be a title than a prison. This should not be permitted. The law should apply equally to all men. The man who steals a million dollars or ten who steals a million dollars or ten million dollars from his fellow men by watering the stock of a company or by a merger of companies, should be forced to make restitution and should be punished even though he is a magnate of industry or a bank president. I also believe that excess profits should be taxed. Any fair system of taxation is based upon a consideration of several things: citisenships services received and shilling to pay. Our municipal taxes are raised mostly from assessment on real property. Why shouldn't excess profits be made to contribute? When we elect millionaires as our premiers we have only aires as our premiers we have only ourselves to blame if we are unfairly taxed, such as the tax on sugar which takes twenty million dollars annually out of the pockets of people who can ill afford to pay and leaves the holdings of the wealthy practically untouched. I am in favour of legislation preventing the watering of stock, preventing the theft from the public by mergers of companies, and I am in favour of fair taxation of profits. If all of this is done mass accumulation of wealth in a few hands to the detriment of the masses will be prevented.

After the people of this province have suffered distress and want for the past four and one-half years. Mr. Henry has at last made a declaration on unemployment insurance and minmum wage for men. The following to

the text in part: "We are anxious to co-operate . . .
. . . in providing unemployment insurance. The government is in favour
of a minimum wage for men and will
take the necessary steps immediately
to confer . . as to the best plan to carry this out."

He has had full opportunity during all of his years of office to do his duty

in regard to unemployment insurance and minimum wage laws, but it is not until he is forced to face at the polls a justly hostile electorate that he finally makes a death-bad confession. He admits in effect that he should have done these things and if given another chance, promises to do there have done these things and if given another chance, promises to do them. When he admits they are necessary he is perfectly right, but where has he been all these years when he just finds it out now? He doarn't even trouble to try to excuse his failure to do anything. Has he been askeep or didn't he want to do it? Put on faith in death-bed confessions or promises. The patient might recover and again change his mind. You remember the promises to end unemployment made by Mr. Bennett and how well they have been kept. Mr. Henry cannot excuse himself by blaming Ottaws. He and his friend. Mr. Hennett, have had full control and, unfortunately for the country, they have both had majorities so large they could do as they pleased. They are consequently entitled to all of the glory and to all of the blame.
