With that thought before u. let us consider what has taken place with regard to agriculture in recent years. At no time has the Henry administration marked time in its efforts to bring about the greatest postible improvement in agriculture. One can point to effective steps taken to improve livestock types; to develop better varieties of field crops; to work out systems of crop rotation and fertilizing that would maintain the productivity of the soil

While this was going on the situation was studied with a view to securing new markets for the products of the farm. We find now that Ontario white winter wheat is particularly valuable as poultry feed, and a new market has now been found for one million bushels a year. Through the efforts of Col. T. L. Kennedy, Minister of Agriculture, dairy farmers who will in the Toronto area have been getting 25 per cent. better price for winter milk than a year ago. What does this mean?

Another million dollars a scar. Col. Kennedy then went shead to convince the people that Ontario farm products were the best. He organized the 'Ontario Parm Products Campaign" and pushed the demand for domestic products through many channels. Over 2,000 stores carried a display last fall, demand was stimulated. The purchaser felt that there was something worth while about the home grown article. The furface saw that his efforts were rewarded, and the ultimate result was that money was spent in Ontario that would have

been cent away to buy in other countries. The same thing has been done in growing barley for maiting pur-poses. Why should we import millions of bushels of burley when we can grow the best malting barley at home? Later I will deal with the assistance that has been given to fruit growers, and again show where markets have been developed, subsidies

given to packing and storage plants, and the experimental work at the Lorticultural stations extended. There is another phase of the Henry government's policy towards agriculture that cannot be too strongly emphasized. I refer to hydroelectric service in the rural parts. I might mention in passing that Milton, Acton and Georgetown have done so well with Hydro that their local systems have sufficient available assets to free the system of all debt. While this result has been achieved rates have been kept low.

In Halton County there are several rural power districts. No work for the social betterment of the people of Ontario can exceed what has been done by the Hydro-Electric Power Commission assisted by grants-inaid from the provincial treasury to put electric power on the farms and in the farm houses. Itural power systems extend from Acton, Georgetown and Million, serving close on 700 farms. Let me explain the invitation that the Henry government holds out

to every farmer within reach of the Hydro lines. It will pay 80 per cent tone-halft the cost of building the line from the Commission's supply point to the customer's property. The Commission is allowed to fix a maximum monthly service charge in a rural power district. But where the district is newly established and there is not sufficient revenue to meet the necessary cost of service, the shortage is defrayed by the Province and carried in a suspense account to be dealt with after the system shows a surplus. Then there is the Rural Power District Loans Act, passed in 1930. to enable the farmer to have his property equipped for the use of electric power. This means wiring the house and buildings, and loans for the purchase of transformers, motors, feed grinders, milking machines, pumps, and so on, which he may be able to use. Nearly \$100,000 has been loaned to farmers under this method. It is simple, inexpensive and most bene-

To-day there are over 62,000 rural power consumers. The Hydro-Electric Power Commission has expended \$17,603,875 in building lines and actting up equipment, towards which the Henry government has contri-Among all the counties of Ontario, Halton stands in the forefront

as benefiting by this progressive policy. 
