Helow will be found a brief synop-als of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branches:-General-Hain, have been cally general in the Prairie Provinces during the past two days, the precipibeing purticularly heavy throughout Ha katchewan and Bouthern Alberta. These rains have fullowed a week of cool weather and cattered showers-conditions have been beneficial to the crops which, generally speaking, are making satisfactory progress. Onewhoppers are numerous and are still a menace but beyond some damage reported in Bouthern Backstchewan and Manitoba the destruction of crops by thes pests has not so far teen serious. In Queourship weather and are showing healthy growth. In Ontario secent rains have improved crops generally and have revited grass pastures throughout the Province. In the Maritime Provinces the ground con-tains ample moisture and sarm teather is now needed. In limitals Columbia good growing conditions continue, and in most districts there to sufficient incluture for present requirement.






