**Poultry as You Like It!**

 Chicken, when company comes? Of course! But do not stick to fried, broiled or roasted chicken. Serve unusual chicken dishes that will please and surprise. Season well. Salt and pepper is not enough. Take a tip from the recipe and add a little sugar—just enough to sweeten but enough to bring out the full flavor.

**Chicken Meringue**  
 1 young chicken  
 1 cup butter  
 1 finely chopped onion  
 1 small carrot, cut in cubes  
 1 turnip, cut in cubes  
 1 cup canned tomatoes  
 1 teaspoon sugar  
 Salt and pepper

Out up a young chicken in quarters. Sprinkle with salt and pepper, dredge with flour and brown in salt pork fat. Put in a baking dish with the other ingredients and cook slowly in the oven until the chicken is tender. Serve in the dish in which it was cooked.

**Marinated Chicken**  
 4 to 6 pound fowl  
 4 to 6 potatoes  
 1 cup seedless raisins  
 3 cups canned tomatoes  
 Butter  
 1 tablespoon sugar  
 2 tablespoons chopped onion  
 2 tablespoons parsley  
 Flour  
 Salt and pepper

Simmer the small quantity of salted water until tender. Remove from the heat. Set the fowl aside for stuffing. To the chicken broth add the canned tomatoes, sugar and the finely chopped onion. Let this sauce cook down. In the meantime prepare the stuffing by cooking and mashing the potatoes. Add salt, while still hot, to the stuffing body cavity and neck of the fowl. Crowd in all the stuffing possible. Pour a quart of hot water over the chicken. Put it in the oven to brown. Thicken the tomato sauce to the consistency of a gravy and add 2 or 3 tablespoons of finely chopped parsley and green pepper, if desired. When the chicken and the surface of the potato stuffing have become delicately brown, place on a large hot platter. Pour part of the sauce around the chicken and serve at once.

**COFFEE ICE CREAM**  
 1/2 pint milk  
 1/2 pint heavy cream  
 1 package powder for coffee junkie  
 Small pinch of salt (if desired)  
 Warm milk to lukewarm (about 110 degrees F.)—NOT HOT. Remove from stove. Add powder for coffee junkie and small pinch of salt, if desired. Stir not more than one minute. Pour immediately into refrigerator. Lay aside until in room until firm and cool—about ten minutes. Whip the cream and stir into junkie mixture and stir into junkie mixture. Place in freezing compartment in the refrigerator as cold as temperature as possible. When partly frozen it will be thick around the edges. Scrape from the sides and bottom of the pan and then beat the contents up in a refrigerator trap quickly with a fork or large spoon, and place in refrigerator to finish freezing.

**Lasab Choppe with Oranges**  
 (Serves 6)  
 6 lamb chops or pork chops  
 6 sliced butter  
 6 sliced oranges  
 Salt, pepper and paprika  
 Trim fat from thick chops and dip in melted butter. Oil broiler well and broil chops 8 minutes. Turn and broil a thick slice of peeled orange on each chop. Broil 8 or 10 minutes longer. Broil chops thoroughly with the sauce. Serve hot.

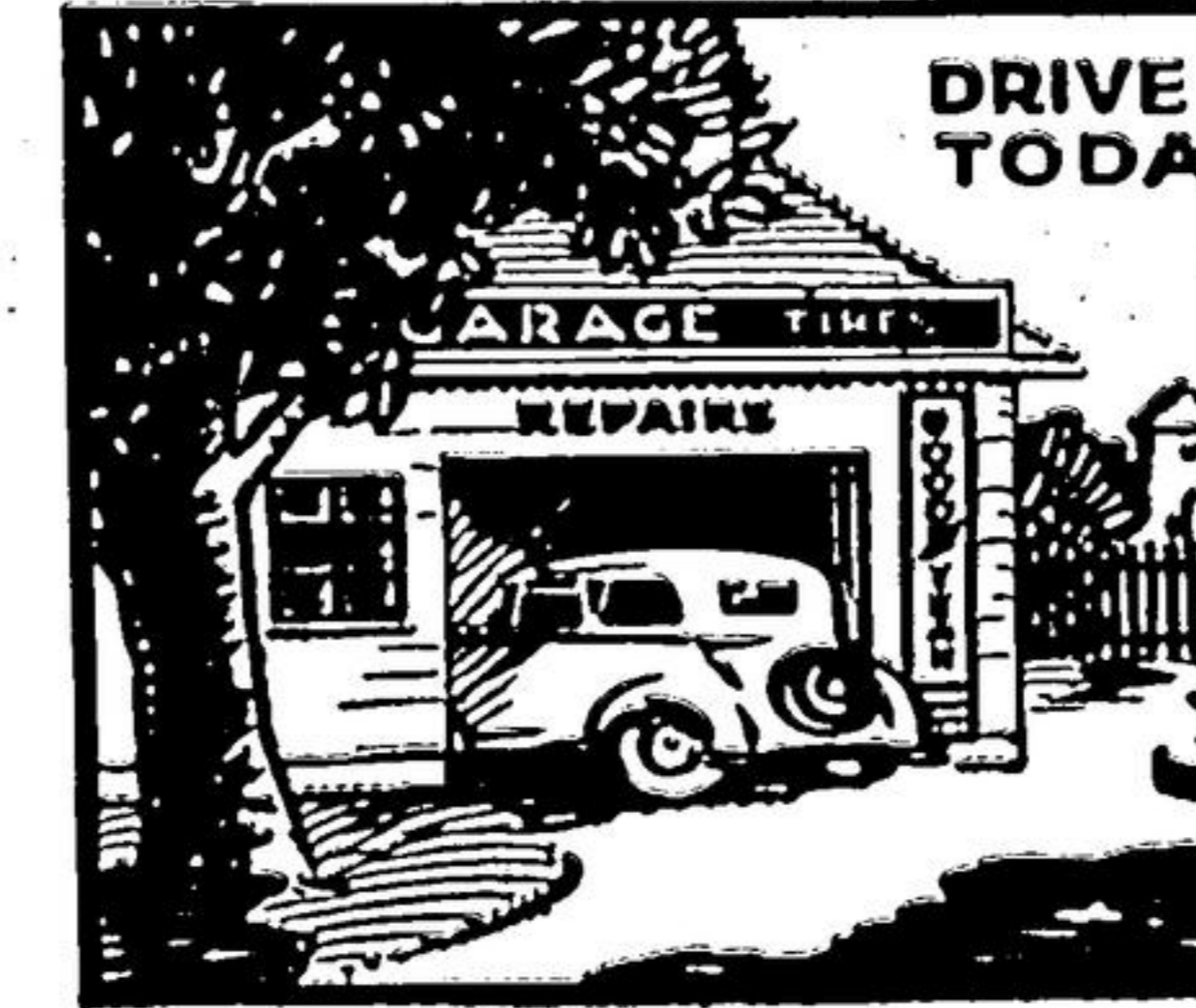
