By Betty Barclay Chicken when company comes? Of course! But do not stick to fried broiled or rossted chicken. Berve unusual chicken dishes that will both please and surprise. Beason well. a tip from the experts and add little sugar-not enough to sweeten but enough to bring out the full flavor.


