BALES REGULATIONS

Pollowing are the main points of

the new beer and wine rules that went into effect last week: liser may be sold in clubs, standard hotel dining and beverage rooms, railway cars and atsamahins Molders of "authorities." as licenses will be termed, will be required to keep books showing purchases, sales, stock transactions. Promises of holders of "authorities" are to be open at all times for inspec-

Cash must be paid for all purchases. No persons under the age of 18 may be employed by holders of authorities. Beer may be sold every day, excepting Sunday, from 10 a.m. to 12 midnight, but the board may from time to time limit the hours of sale to times other than those stipulated. No beer may be sold on Bunday, Good Friday or Christmas Day, or on any other statutory holiday. All purhases by the holders of authorities of imported wines must be made through Government stores. Beer purchased by holders of authorities must be made from beer warehouses, not direct from breweries. No permits will be necessary for the nurchase of beer.

Bervice of beer and wines dining rooms confined to param, ed at table consuming meal. Beer may not be served over . Ay hotel counter. It may be serve in notel rooms to guests who are the registered occupants. Clubs in which beer and wine are

to be sold must furnish the Board with certified lists of members ennuand beer and wine can only be to bons-fide members of those Holders of authority to sell beer
