GASOLINE AND REGISTRATION TEXE \$160,000,000 IN ONYARIO

Over \$100,000,000 has been paid into the Ontario provincial treasury in the last air years by motorists in gasoline taxation and registration fees alone it is shown in official statistics obtained from the Dominion Bureau of taxation, since 1938, has yielded \$61. 636.666, while registration foce total-Led \$41,315,374, making a grand total of \$103,261,430 collected from motorlate' pockets in taxes, in aix years. The gasoline tax receipts amounted fram \$4,607,380 in 1928 to a peak of 411 810.755 in 1933 and then decreased to \$12.833,577 last year, while the peak when the total collected was \$7,640,765. Today, Ontario's debt for roads and highways amounts to \$186,380,000 and this has been mounting steadily in the last few years while motorists' organivations claim it should have decreased in view of the stupendous sum collected from motorists who represent, in last year's official figures, only \$14.77 per cent of the population.
In the Bureau's most recent figures. belanced against the provincial roadway debt, southern Ontario had 53 .at the end of 1933, while there were 57.119 miles at the end of 1931. In morthern Ontario there were 14,943 miles open as at October 31, 1933. compared with 14,391 miles the previous year, but both these totals in-clude "provincial" as well as "other"



These guides are the newspaper advertisements. In this newspaper, they are a catalogue of the best values in town-signed by responsible firms. If the goods are not all that is claimed for them, their sponsors would need to "beware." For no business can thrive on a one-time sale, or on dissatisfied customers.

A signed advertisement is, in a way, like a promissory note. The advertiser has made a statement, and affixed his signature as a sign of good faith.

So, read the advertisements before you start out on a buying-trip. Make this a daily habit, and see how much you save-in time, in temper, in money, in shoe-
