Robert Francis Lerlie, an esteemed local resident, passed away in the Royal Memorial Hospital on Saturday, August 18th, after an illness of one week. A son of the late George Lerlie, who came from County Tyrone, Ireland, who was one of the pioneer settlers in Chinquago county, Ontario. He was born on the old homestead in the town of Chinquago, 60 years ago. For many years he farmed here, moving to Norway village 14 years ago. He was a member of the United Presbyterian Church and later was honored with a similar position at Norway United Church. In politics, he was a Liberal. Always deeply interested in the welfare of the community, his death was mourned with deep regret by friends both in Chinquago and in Norway. ARTHUR M. TYRRELL DIED AT KAMLOOPS

WAR FORMER MGR AND ALDERMAN OF THAT CITY AND AN OLD GEORGETOWN BOY

The following from the Kamloops Sentinel of Aug. 16th, refers to a former Georgetown boy who will be remembered by many of our older citizens:

The entire city and district was grieved to learn of the passing away on Sunday of Arthur Martin Tyrrell, who died in his sleep at the Royal Inland Hospital following an illness of about two weeks. Mr. Tyrrell was manager for the Maple Leaf Milling Co. throughout the maritime district of the interior. He is survived by his wife and one son, Arthur Harold, and the sister, Mrs. A. Gibbons Hamilton Ontario.

The deceased had been in failing health for some time, having just recently resumed his duties after recuperating from an illness in the spring. He was struck with a heart attack on the morning of his death. He was a member of the Royal Inland Hospital. On Saturday was held among citizens generally a funeral service, which was presided over by the Rev. J. M. Buck, of the Presbyterian Church. The service was held at 11:30 a.m. and was attended by a large number of friends. The late Mr. Tyrrell was 53 years of age, having been born in Georgetown, Ontario, in 1881.
