Georgetown Cemetery

WHERE LOYALISTS REST

When King George's troops took the United Empire Loyalists to the Loyalistbury around 1784, this cemetery is in the heart of the Loyalist community. In 1784 a year after the Loyalists settled the ground so far as 1848 closed the ground so far as the stones remain upright. Some are crumpled and broken, and others were removed.

One of the notable gravestones is that of Captain John Adams, son of General Howe, commander of the British forces in America. John Adams died in 1784 in an effort to adjust the differences between the British authorities and the Loyalists. The scene of these endeavours was at St. John's Falls, N.Y.

A stone slab supported by four pillars marks the grave of Major Miller, who according to local tradition, fashioned the British flag. Major Miller, an architect, civil engineer and surveyor, was born in Derbyshire, England, and record show that one John Adams of Boston, Massachusetts, was the first to make work on the monument.

One of the most conspicuous monuments was erected in memory of James Purdon, last attorney-general under Sir Molyneux in the province of Massachusetts.
