

ANCIENT RAIL TICKET TURNS UP FOR REPUND

Unused railroad tickets, like chickens, comotimes come home to roostwith requests for refund of fare on their unused portions. However, it is not often that a ticket issued in 1870 comes to the Canadian National Railways with such a request tagged to it.

After a lapse of 64 years a ticket issued at Ohicago in September 1870 Oity Passenger Agent of the Canadian National Railways, with a request for refund on the unused portion. The Mass., said he had been informed when purchasing the ticket that it was good "until used" but he had never used it. The ticket, of Grand Trunk issue and in good condition, was accompanied by a slip issued by the Michigan Central and Great Western Railways "the great central route via Niagara Palls to all points east" authorizing unlimited stopovers.


