"News of the passing of Miss Lily A. McCullough, who for many years past was an outstanding leader in educational work in this city, both in the school and the church, will be received with deep sadness. She was a host of friends in this city and throughout the surrounding district. The late Miss McCullough accumulated an impressive record of service during her long life. She was a member of the Owen Sound public schools, teaching first at St. Catharines and in later years, at Dufferin. Miss McCullough earned the love and respect of pupils and fellow-teachers alike and it was with regret that they saw her retirement from active teaching work three years ago when she was 60 years of age. News of her death will occasion deep sorrow to those who had the privilege of learning under her guidance.

"Deceased was a faithful member of Division No. 10, United Brethren Presbyterian Church and was an active worker. Since her superannuation, she had devoted all her time to church work and her aid will be sadly missed. A life member of the Women's Missionary Society of the church, she had been associate secretary for several years and carried out this work, paying many visits, in a manner which earned her high praise for her zeal and efficiency. The late Miss McCullough had also been in charge of the Credit Union of the Sunday School for many years and had been in charge of the help of knitting booties for every new baby.

### MONEY BY-LAW AND ACCOUNTS PAID—ELECTION OFFICERS APPOINTED

Council met in regular session on Tuesday evening, Mayor Osborne in the chair, Mayor Osborne and Councilors Perry, Bright, Cummings, McAndrew, MacLaren and Buck present. Minutes of previous meetings read and confirmed.

Communications were read from City of Kitchener, J. A. Ellis, B. Kirk, Bell Telephone Co., Ontario Department of Health, Lawson and Stratton, W. I. Dick, City of Windsor, Dr. H. H. Williams, M.H.O. for Georgetown presented his annual report.

Moved by MacAndrew, seconded by MacLaren, that Dr. O. V. Williams, M.H.O. be complimented and thanked for his annual report which fully covered all phases pertaining to the health of the Municipality—Carried.

Mr. H. H. Williams, M.H.O. reported that he had been called for two years, but had not given using same during that time.

Moved by Perry, seconded by Bright, that the rate of \$15 be charged to Mr. MacLaren be discontinued as this service had been discontinued.

Mr. A. Hyde addressed Council regarding concreting grade at approach to proposed bridge over creek. Council agreed to cooperate with Mr. Hyde in proposed work, the work for concreting to be put in proper and safe condition.

Moved by MacLaren, seconded by Perry, that the following accounts be paid: J. MacLaren, \$11.00; J. A. Ellis, \$2.00; B. The By-law to appoint Deputy Returning Officers and Poll Clerks for the Municipal election was read. It was necessary on Dec. 3rd, was passed and the following appointed:—Ward One—Deputy Returning Officer, H. C. Adams; Poll Clerk, James Kennedy. Ward Two—Deputy Returning Officer, George Davis; Poll Clerk, D. H. Harker. Ward Three—Deputy Returning Officer, H. C. Bailey; Poll Clerk, Geo. Alcott.

By-law to authorize the Mayor and Treasurer to borrow an additional \$20,000 to meet the current expenses of the corporation until the 1st of January, 1935, and to pay the necessary amount of times and finally passed.

Moved by Cummings, seconded by MacLaren, that the Mayor and Treasurer be authorized to make application to the Municipal Board for permission to borrow an amount up to \$20,000 of our estimated revenue for the year 1934, and to pay the necessary legal fees—Carried.

Moved by Perry, seconded by MacLaren, that the Mayor and Treasurer meet on November 15th at 8 p.m. or at the call of the Mayor—Carried.
