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



It is admitted that the quality of milk now being sold is very much improved over that of 7 years ago; the honesty and conscientiousness of the average raw milk dealer, together with the co-operation, technical advice, and testing of herds by our stilk inspector has accounted for this. Health authorities are unanimous in stating that all municipal milk supplies abould be pasteurised. Until such a by-law is passed, the following suggestions for improved condi-
