Christmas Greetings



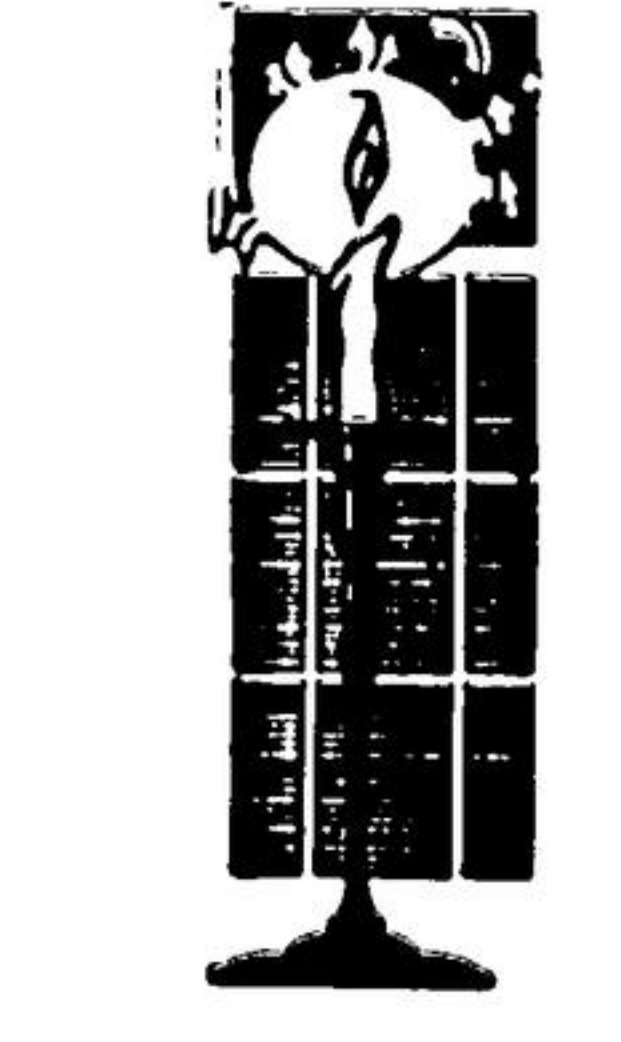

THE CHRISTMAS SPIRIT

Back of all the outward manifestations of the festive season; behind the greetings on the street, the giving of presents, the crowding of decorated churches, and the singing of joyous carols, there lies that which gives a genuine value to all this substantial expression. It is the spirit of Christmas.

Viewing all these festivities, we may well ask—what is the spirit of Christmas? It is the spirit of the Mother and the child; it is both parental and filial love in its purest and sweetest form. Christmas is about everything else the children's feet. Let us not be afraid of being too human on Christmas day. The closer we come to the heart of children, the nearer we draw to the Christ of Bethlehem. This is the Christmas message which is expressed so clearly by St. John: "God is love and love comes from God. He who lives in love lives in God and God in him."

Religion is not something apart by itself, a strange and foreign element which comes into our life in an unnatural manner. Religion is that which unites our whole being by giving us a supreme purpose and motive round which we can organize all our scattered interests. Religion is that which reinforces our natural instincts, such as parental and filial love, with a fresh infusing from the infinite and the eternal. Religion is that which enables us to realize all our values as to what is highest and best in life, and in the Christian revelation the Mother and the Child are not given a lower but a higher place. We shall find a babe lying in a manger.

The spirit of Christmas, while intensely human, is not exclusive. While it brings sunshine into our own dwelling and makes our children peal with laughter, it always carries us further afield with the longings to make other homes brighter and other children happier.

And so, rising like an acropolis in circles from the earth, we discover the spirit of the Universal Father, Father revealing His infinite love for all His children in a visible and tangible manner. God so loved the world of man and woman and children that He gave of His Immutability a part to live and labor and suffer in our very midst; and in our outward form so as to bring the Divine and human into the closest possible fellowship.

In a word the spirit of Christmas is the spirit of Christ. It is the spirit of self-sacrificing love for the good of all; assisting the needy, guiding the perplexed, cheering the despondent, comforting the sorrowing, strengthening the weak, and inspiring the brave. The spirit of Christmas shines at brightest peace and goodwill into every dark corner of the social world.

The spirit of Christmas can never die. The story of the Mother and the Child will be told with renewed interest from age to age. The message of the eternal love of the Universal Father will go ringing down the centuries, cheering the weary, because, however men may advance in intelligence and develop in character, the need for fellowship, both human and divine will never die. The spirit of Christ must be made incarnate in us as individuals and in humanity as a whole before the spirit of Christmas can be discerned.—E. Du Verne, Archbishop of California.

SILVER DOLLAR COMING

AN Ottawa despatch of Monday last says: Canada's first silver dollar will be minted and circulated as a commemorative issue to mark the centenary of King George's accession to the throne on May 6, 1833. It will be known as the "George" and will bear a likeness of His Majesty. No official announcement has yet been made, but it is known that the design has been approved and an order for the minting of the first million has been issued to manufacture. The minting will be done in Ottawa. The design of the reverse has been authorized in the currency act for the minting of a Canadian silver dollar but none has ever been placed in circulation. The extent of the popularity will determine the amount of currency to be issued in this form but it is understood the first minting will run to at least 100,000. Only slightly larger in circumference than the 50-cent piece the new coin will be thick and, in the opinion of the experts who designed it, fully acceptable from the point of view of convenience of handling, as the smaller coin. The "George" dollar will be circulated during the silver jubilee proceedings in London.

FAMOUS PAINTERS ON YULE SUBJECT

Some of the world's most famous picture have dealt with scenes inseparably connected with the nativity of Christ.

Deep under the Eternal City, in those strange tunnels where Christians sheltered from the persecutions of the Roman emperors, you can still see upon the walls rude paintings of the Christ-child made fully eighteen centuries ago.

For the earliest of them, however, are not very interesting from the artistic point of view. That great painter, Cimabue, who was born in 1240, was the first artist to show how wonderful a picture could be made of the Infant Christ and His Mother. His work was finished in 1280. It was taken in solemn procession from his studio to the church, the crowd shouting with delight when it was unveiled.
