The rates for power to the Georgetown Hydro Commission have been raised considerably and the cost this year will be nearly \$2500. extra. This will certainly mean that there will be a deficit unless some saving can be made.

The amount of power used between the hours of five and six p.m. during the winter determines the amount the Commission must pay, as at this time the street lights are on and the factories still running.

The rates to the homes are low in Georgetown and they would be the first to be raised. In order to avoid any necessity to raise these house rates, the Commission appeals to Customers not to use any appliance that they can do without during the hour from five to six p.m. The co-operation of the ladies at this hour will mean a big saving to the Commission and will avoid any need to raise the rates.

NORVAL JUNIOR INSTITUTE AND JUNIOR FARMERS

The Norval Junior Institute and Junior Farmers held a delightful meeting at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Lyons on Tuesday evening, Dec. 18th. The roll call was announced with the name of a different common to domestic animals.

Mr. Spencer Wilson gave an interesting lecture on parasites common to sheep and methods of prevention. If an animal is free from parasites its market value and quality is greatly improved. Furthermore it is more economical to feed and condition a healthy animal. An effective cure for coccidiosis in sheep is blue stone powder or arsenic capsule. Two quarts of water dose the affected animals twice a year. Giving one ounce of the solution to lambs, two ounces to yearlings and three to four ounces to ewes.

Putrefactive fumes or burine is a good cure for headworms. A mixture of ten pounds of salt and one pound of blue stone is dissolved in a 100 gallon tank. The animals are free from internal parasites.

Flipping in the spring and in the middle of September kills such parasites as lice and ticks. The body of sheep should be clean and dry, as well as the wool. If parasites and disease are to be kept out of the wool, the sheep should be washed with a strong odor emanates from the wool. In case such as this, the horn should be pared well and better bandon applied or sine sulphate, followed after an interval with an application of kerosene or coal oil.

Acute indigestion is also a common disease of horses, caused by watering the horse with cold water, improper feeding or care. A drachm of one pint of turpentine in two quarts of linseed oil is an efficient remedy.

Paralysis, the symptoms of which is an inordinate amount of sweat, drooping of the head, and the affected animal to shiver, blanket it, apply hot oats or manure over the sides to retain the heat, send immediately for a veterinarian or in mild case dose with sweet nitre or two pints of spirit of turpentine in raw milk. Always keep the animal in a standing position.

Stink eye, a film comes over the eye causing him to blink. Put some arjari in the eye with a syringe and send immediately for veterinary because advanced cases are incurable. Rough or scurvy legs, wash with a very strong salt brine to remove dirt and apply oil or vasoline to soften and heal the wounds.

In case of spasmodic and other ailments of the eye, rub the eye with a horse in violent pain, call a veterinarian.
