TOWN COUNCIL
MONEY BY-LAW PASSED - APPOINTMENTS MADE - WANT LOWER INTEREST RATE FROM BANK

Council met at 8 p.m. on Thursday, January 17th. Members present: Mayor Gibbons, Reeve Cleave and Councilors A. J. Bennett, W. E. Smith, C. Armstrong, F. H. Blackburn and Davis.

F. McDonald and E. R. MacLaughlin asked for a renewal of by-law No. 100, which provides for the regulation of the interest rate on money loaned by banks in the town.

A discussion took place in regard to the striking of the standing committee on Finance and Public Affairs. Communications were read from Toronto General Hospital, Ottawa (Private) Hospital, St. George's Hospital, Mountain Sanatorium and St. Charles Hospital.

REGISTRAR OF DEEDS FOR HAMILTON PASSES IN HAMILTON HOSPITAL

George H. Hillmer, ex-M.P.P., one of Ontario's most distinguished statesmen, died in Hamilton General Hospital about 10 o'clock Friday night.

Mr. Hillmer was born in York, Ontario, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hillmer. He was educated in Ontario and followed the profession of a lawyer. He was Registrar of Deeds for Hamilton County for many years. He was a member of the Ontario Bar Association and the Ontario Legislative Council. He was also a member of the Executive Committee of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture. He was a prominent public figure and a devoted citizen.
