RESULTS OF BOY TREATMENT The programme for the elimination of the bot fly in Halton which & sponsored by the county Live Stock Improvement Association is meeting with an excellent response. According to canvassers' reports which have been turned in to Agricultural Man-resentative, J. K. Whitelook, over 2,000 horses will be treated this year. Boyeral hundred horses have already been treated by the county veterinarlans and horse owners interviewed express themselves as well pleased with the results. THE FIRST REAL CANADIAN MONEY

Illustry relates that Canada, in 1817, "was too poor to shord the fuxury of a metallic circulating madium, and the development of trade and agriculture was hampered by the lack of facilities for exchange."

American money, also British and French and some Spanish and Portuguese, was used-all subject to Successing rates of exchange and causing monetary confusion. There was no Canadian money, either coin or paper.
