The SNAPSHOT GUILD

STUDY YOUR COMPOSITION

It is quite obvious that pictures of groups of people, or animals, such as the horses shown above, should be taken with the camera in a horizontal position, while, on the other hand, a landscape picture, or a picture of a single figure standing in a high doorway, obviously should be taken with the camera in a vertical position.

NEWSPAPER cameramen are sometimes sharply criticized by those who consider photography as an art, for various faults in composition, lighting, shadows, etc. These critics may be right but they do not stop to consider that the news cameraman must take his pictures when he can get it and often on the run. It's the picture of an individual or action he is after and heaven help him if he returns to his city editor and says, "Sorry chief, but I didn't get that picture of the mayor being strangled. The sun was in the wrong position, the shadows terrible and the mayor was in an awkward pose when he was struck." Ooh!—Shudder to think of what would happen to that cameraman!

There is one point, however, we can all agree on. The news cameraman and profit if in taking more interesting pictures. It is this, include only the principal subject in a picture. In other words, if you are taking a picture of an individual or a group, focus the lens on the principal subject and forget about the surrounding scenery, building, or whatever it may be, unless the background is of some importance and is part of the story.

If you are taking a landscape picture determine before you "shoot" the most attractive view and concentrate your focus on that spot. Two pictures showing two well composed and attractive scenes are worth many snapshots with insupportable points of possible interest. There is the shape of the picture to consider. First of all this is controlled by the way the camera is held—vertically or horizontally.

BOY SCOUT MOVEMENT IS ADDRESSING BY EKUYENYAN GOVERNOR

If you speak to a boy about camping you will see his eyes sparkle as he reflects the bright gleam of camp fire. If you tell him a story of a boy who was a scout, you will see him on some distant frontier or of some lonely pathfinder in the wilds of the world, he will sit silent, enraptured, looking at you and drinking in every word you say. Talk to any boy of mountain peaks and valleys, of forests and waterfalls and with vivid, poetic imagination he will feel the wind of high places on his cheek; he will hear the stirring of leaves, he will see birds on the wing and catch glimpses of those furry, swift-footed creatures that have read about but has never seen.

Never are senses so keen, never are purposes so high, never are ideals so unattainable and never is an outlet so necessary for all these fine, fresh, youthful impulses as in boyhood.

That is why I welcome this opportunity to speak of the finest organization for boys that exists in the world today, the Boy Scouts.

Natural love of boys for the outdoors, all their longing for good comradeship, all their healthy desire for play and adventure finds complete expression in the Boy Scout organization. But even more important than these is the inculcation of all those qualities of heart and mind and body which make for good citizenship. A Boy Scout is self-reliant, his is loyal. He learns to be useful. Above all he learns to share his help with others.

Those listening to me this evening have come to hear the splendid address in order to recognize, better than through any words of mine, that by inaugurating a campaign for the extension of the Boy Scouts Association in Canada and by issuing a challenge to the Boy Scouts to increase their numbers from 60,000 to not less than 100,000, His Excellency the Governor General is rendering a service of unparalleled importance to the youth of this Dominion.

Every normal boy wants to be a Boy Scout. And my own admiration for this great youth movement and the value of its training is such that I am convinced that the whole duty of a father to his son has not been discharged until that boy has been encouraged to join the Boy Scout organization. For that organization will make true, loyal, honourable, useful man of any boy. It will make him in a word a good Scout—than which no higher tribute exists in Canada.

There are hundreds of communities even now where there are no Boy Scouts. The more you know about the aims and ideals of Boy Scouts the more keenly will you understand what a great loss that is to the boys of our community. But it is not, I feel sure, for the sake of the boys of our community to make good that we should be content with a partial co-operation in this campaign and by a serious effort to make available to all boys the opportunity to become Boy Scouts that makes not least that money will be necessary to carry it out.

May I, therefore, urge all my listeners to do all that lies in their power to make the extension of the Boy Scout movement a glorious reality. Then when Lord Baden-Powell, the Chief Scout of the World, comes to Canada next spring, he will find not 60,000 but many more Boy Scouts—representing the flower of our youth in every age and social community in every Province.

Let us, I pray, the President of this great movement for the boys of Canada has himself told me with what enthusiasm, with what joy and with what a profound sense of duty to do, and responsibility for youth he has entered into this great campaign for our boys. And I am sure that no finer tribute that could be paid to the Governor General, just as I know that he himself in this year of his departure from Canada would wish to leave behind him no more fragrant and enduring legacy than that of being remembered for generations to come as the inspirer and the inaugurator of this splendid campaign for the Youth of Canada.—The country in which he has with such charm and vigor distinguished himself as representative of His Gracious Majesty the King.
