The Ottawa Spotlight

Ottawa, March 5.—The proposal to create a wheat board is the fulfilment of a promise which was made freely by the farmers of the west; first in the years which followed the collapse of the wheat price after the war, again in the period from 1920 on to the present. Whether it is now being adopted in compliance with public opinion, or because the government had got into such a bad jam through its stabilization policy is a matter which will be answered differently by different parties; perhaps it does not matter very much until the government comes out and explains exactly what it proposes to do, commentators are working it something of a mixed bag; but judging from a study of the problem from a great many angles, it seems very likely that the board will be used as an agency for getting rid of our wheat without breaking the domestic price.

Wheat Export Very Slow

It has been clear for several months that the policy of raising prices on the Winnipeg market has been a failure. Farmers have been unable to export the wheat at the price they desired. Canada's wheat has been moving at a very slow rate, and after two very light harvests, Canada is going into a new crop year with the heaviest carryover on record. Then future prospects must be considered. But what was the government to do? WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION STATEMENT

During the month of February there were 4,328 accidents reported to the Workmen's Compensation Board, as compared with 4,372 during January, and 5,320 during February a year ago. The total cases numbered 21, as against 20 in January.

The benefits awarded amounted to \$43,504.35, of which \$22,234.24 was for compensation and \$21,270.11 for medical aid.

ALPHA SEED SUPPLY

The Alpha seed supply in Canada is now regarded as no more than a surplus for seed requirements this coming spring, being somewhat smaller than was formerly expected. In Ontario the 1934 seed crop was lighter than normal. Much of the seed was lacking in plumpness, and weight owing to insufficient rainfall during the sowing season. This was true particularly of seed saved from the second cutting.
