"The Ottawa Spotlight"

Ottawa, March 8.—The proposal to construct a new bridge across the St. Lawrence River, which was made recently by the fathers of the West: first in the years which followed the collapse of the bridge which had failed the winter again, in the period from 1804 to 1807.

Whether it is now being adopted in compliance with public opinion, or because the government has come to such a hasty decision through its stabilization policy, is a matter which will be answered differently by different parties, perhaps it does not matter much which party it comes from, but what does come out and explain exactly what it proposes to do, commentators are working at something of a dead-end stage, but just now from a study of the present front in great many angles, it seems very likely that the board will be used as an agency for getting rid of old wheat without breaking the domestic market.
