RELIEF MONEY TO COME OUT OF TOWN TREASURY—COMMISSION APPPOINTED

Council met at 8 p.m. March 13th.

Members present: Mayor Gilchrist,

Councillors Parry, Speight, Armstrong, Blackburn and

Morrison.

Moved by Parry, seconded by Hogigh-

ian that whereas the Central Halton Com-

mittee has discontinued adminis-

tration in Georgetown, and

whereas the responsibility now de-

volves upon the Municipality for the

administration of such and the funds

available to the Municipality for the

Municipal treasury, it is resolved by

the Council that a Commission of three

members be appointed: one represent-

ing the Municipality of Georgetown,

one representing all local organiza-

tions, and one representing the

Canadian Legion—Carried.

Moved by Hogighian, seconded by Cleaver,

that the appointment be carried out in

Georgetown council of A. Macleod,

Mr. J. H. MacKinnon and John D.

Dunn. It was decided that this appointment take

effect Monday, March 19, 1935—Carried.

Moved by Armstrong, seconded by

Parry, that we do now adjourn to

the next regular meeting or at

the call of the Mayor—Carried.
