FOREST TREES

This is the time of year that farmers and others who wish to secure trees for reforestation should send their applications to the Ontario Forestry Branch. Trees available for planting are white, red, jack and Scotch pine, larch, white spruce, white cedar, elm, white oak, soft maple, hard maple, red oak, basswood, Carolina poplar, white willow and walnut. White spruce, Norway spruce and white cedar are also available for planting. The free distribution of seedlings is for certain definite purposes, namely, the reforestation of depleted woodlands, the reclamation of unproductive wastelands, the protection of slopes, hills and light soils from erosion, the afforestation of the conservation of water flow and the planting of shelter belts and windbreaks for the protection of crops.
