CONVICTED OF BEILING IMITATION MAPLE SYRUP

Alexander Rubin, of Ottawa, pleaded guilty in the Ottawa Police Court on March 25th to a charge of selling a table syrup imitating maple syrup in old wine bottles on which the name and origin of the syrup was not clearly indicated.

Magistrate Strick imposed a fine of \$10 and 25 cents or in default three days in jail. The charge was laid by the Fruit Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture under Section 3 of the Maple Sugar Industry Act and regulations which stated:

3. No person shall manufacture or bring an imitation of maple sugar or maple syrup, which is not pure maple sugar or pure maple syrup, unless the nature and origin of such sugar and syrup be clearly indicated.

CANADA IN FIRST PLACE TOMATO TRADE BRITAIN

"It is an ill wind that blows nobody good," at least this is how it figures out during the past season in the matter of tomato imports into the United Kingdom.

Canada now occupies a dominant position in the market, thanks to the National Department of the Canadian National Railway. Italian packers were unable to meet their contracts due to crop failure and a Spanish shipment-packer, which placed Canada in a very favorable position. In the case of tomato soup, Canada is away head of other countries. During the twelve months ending December 1934, Canada supplied 218 cases and the next nearest competitor was the United States with 154 cases. Canada also supplied tomato juice, puree and pulp. Italy predominated in canned tomatoes, followed by Spain and Canada. Spain led in conserve and preserve, followed by Italy, the United States and Canada.
