Golden Text: I am the resurrection,
and the life: he that believeth in me,
though he were dead, yet shall he live.
John 11: 25.
Scripture Passage: Luke 24: 1-12;
John 16: 1-8.

Hurry God, let us be starting,

It was early in the morning when
the resurrection and the life of the

rection. It is difficult to believe
in immortality early in the morning.
When one sees a glorious sunrise,
nothing seems to be too good to be
true. In that serene, serene, serene,
the sense of beginning new day—each
day is a little life, and it seems quite
natural to think that a new life may
begin after death, as well as a new
day after night. It is in the morning
that our spirits are most respon-
sive to the power of God. Frequently
we receive our clearest intuitions
after sunrise. There is sound psychol-
ogy in the practice of having quiet times
early in the morning, listening to
God. In such hours there is a qual-
ity of spiritual life that gives one a
foretaste of what is meant by eternal
life. The soul is vibrant through
fellowship with God, and man feels
that he has a body but is a soul.
Message: How Blessed! 2-7
Belief in the resurrection of Jesus
has not been engineered or manu-
factured. The disciples did not ex-
pect it, and the women who came to
embalm the body of Jesus had no
thought of it. The fact of the empty
tomb had to be explained. The only
explanation that satisfied was that
the spirit of Christ had been too
strong to be hindered by death. The
disciples, however, have to get some ex-
planation adequate for the facts. In-
stead of the crucifixion of Christ,
putting an end to His work, His full-
filled spiritual power was never re-
leased until after Calvary. That power has
endured and spread in a way that is
not to be explained—by the mere
memory of God. Galilean preachers
express the basic Christian faith—
"Up from the grave He arose,"
"Christ is risen today," "He is alive
—blessing and honor, and glory and
praise." "Look ye saints the sight is
glorious." Light of the world! Fan-
ever, ever shining." Christ promised
to be with His people always, a prom-
ise that He is richly fulfilling and
which it would be impossible for Him
to fulfill unless as the living Christ.
He could have fellowship with His
followers.
Scripture and Deeds: 2-11
It is a chilling experience to have
good news to tell which is not be-

lieved by those who hear it. The dis-
ciples were incredulous when the
women brought news of the resur-
rection of Jesus. It was contrary to
their hopes, and it appeared contrary
to common sense. The words were as
idle tales, and the disciples frankly
disbelieved them. Let us think of the
eleven disciples as a jury. Usually
a jury is chosen having no precon-
ceived opinions upon the matter in
question, but the disciples instead
were predisposed to believe in the
resurrection. They were predisposed
to love Christ and yield to despair be-
cause they thought that the cruci-
fixion had forever ended the ministry
of Christ. These disciples were plain,
practical, hard-headed men from
whom we might expect to get a com-
mon-sense answer as to matters of
fact. They soon became evangelists
proclaiming the resurrection. They
felt the spiritual presence of Christ
which we all may feel. The Easter
faith is not a matter of ideas so much
as of experience.
The Many Heavens: 11: 1-3
We form our opinion about what
heaven means as much by what
they do not say as by what they say.
Bible gives more than content. It
gives the process of starting. It
tells that if God did not have a place
prepared for His people, He would
leave them to their own devices. It
is too truthful to deceive them about
the matter of such major importance.
He might have wondered whether it
would be worth while to wait for
people as He did to give them a
spiritual life only for thirty or forty
years. He was fashioning a personal-
ity destined to live on and on. He
was beginning a process of education
that could be begun in life, and that
could not be completed or perfected

Faith in a future life depends upon
our faith in God. If we believe that
the power back of the universe is a
friendly, blind force, then we may
say farewell to a hope of resurrection
after death. If, however, we can be-
lieve with Christ that this power
working in the universe is friendly,
wise and benevolent as a father, then
we may dare to hope confidently that
our spirits are precious in His sight,
that we will be allowed to finish the
development upon which this only
hope is based. There is no better way
than just to try to realize the pres-
ent presence of God as Jesus did.
He lived every moment seeking the
Father's will and enjoying the
Father's presence. He has taught us
how to live in this way. Thereby we
may have a first-hand experience of
God. Nature, science, literature, all
tell us something about the working
of the laws of God, but Christ had
the secret of truth in God as a father
and of unreserved surrender of our
human lives to do His divine will.
This is the secret which, when we
discover and live it, enables us to say
from experience, that Christ is the
way, the truth and the life. We
come to God through Christ, and
when we know God we have a spiri-
tual life within us that is too strong
to be overcome by death.

Let Detaching Material Take Head!
Mr. Justice Wilson, of Montreal has
sentenced a man who pleaded guilty
to criminal negligence in connection
with a fatal automobile accident to
twelve months at hard labor and
ordered him to post a bond of \$500
to keep the peace for another twelve
months or serve an additional year in
prison. The accused had been charged
with manslaughter but the charge
was reduced when he made the state-
ment that at the time his car killed
a man he was so drunk he did not
know what had happened. Hon. T.
McQuinn, Minister of Highways,
stated recently that one reason for
the shocking increase of motor fatali-
ties in Ontario was the failure of
many juries to realize their respon-
sibilities and to carry out their duties.
If all Ontario juries will take courage
from Mr. Justice Wilson's action there
should be a substantial reduction of
motor fatalities in this province.—
