The underlying principle is public profession of discipleship.

A Roman Catholic theologian uttered this wise saying, "Better no conversion, if no nurture." That is, if a new convert is left alone without the support of further teaching and fellowship, there is grave danger of lapaing. Yew people are strong enough to be solliary, secret or silent Christians. The spiritual life is strengthened by sharing. The Ethiopian had been instructed and baptized, but really his battle had only begun. He did not have the advantage of Philip's companionably very long, but he made a good start and when he was left alone, he went on his way rejoicing. The question has been often saked, Did the Ethiopian win his drivers and attendants before he reached home. Did his religion become a household affair? The church exists to give fellowship to those who need the encouragement of spiritual comradaship.
