Throughout the centuries there have been many people of noble Christian character who were moderate users of beverage alcohol. They followed the customs of their time and their high quality of character was doubtless more in spite of the use of liquor than because of it. The present writer has personally known thirty ministers in Canada who have been discredited and disgraced by excessive use of liquor-not even reliherent dangers for some people in the use of liquor. The real point at issue is how far the liquor question constitutes a problem for us. The realities of religion should make beverage alcohol a thing of very small impor-tance relatively. Will a same person allow gin to receive more thought than God? Will the conviviality of social drinking be prized more than the fellowship of worship? Will alcoholic intoxication give more thrill than spiritual inspiration? The King-dom of God is not meat and drink; but righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Spirit. We should try to see things in proportion.


