WILLIAM GRAY
William Gray, one of Orangeville's elderly citizens and for many years a farmer in Amaranth township, passed away at his home on John St., Brantford, Sunday, June 30th, in his 83rd year. Although he had far out-lived the allotted span of life, Mr. Gray was in excellent health up to the time of his demise and had visited his son in Georgetown and his daughter in Toronto only a few days before the last summons came. He expired suddenly while seated at the table in his home. Born on lot 4, 8th line, Amaranth, deceased was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gray, who settled on and cleared this farm property, which is still in the possession of the family. He lived and farmed here until 20 years ago, when he retired and came to Orangeville. His last months were spent in the home of his daughter, Mrs. Russell Bradley, of Toronto. He is also survived by a brother, Robert Gray, of Amaranth, and three sisters, Mrs. Hiram Simons, Orangeville, Mrs. Pauline Bradley, Toronto, and Mrs. James Gibson, Cass City, Michigan. The late Mr. Gray was a quiet, reserved man, honorable in his dealings and a first-class neighbor. Formerly a member of Laurel Methodist Church he had been identified with First Avenue United Church since coming to Orangeville. He was a Liberal in politics and a staunch, true, and honest man. There was a large attendance at the funeral, which was held in Laurel cemetery on Tuesday afternoon, June 30th. Private service was held in the home and was followed by a public service in the Laurel United Church, Rev. J. O. Johnston of Berkeley United Church, Toronto, officiated and was assisted by Rev. C. F. McElroy, Orangeville. The pallbearers were six nephews, Messrs. Bert Tribble, James Tribble, Vernon Gray, William Gibson, Alfred and Louis Mahony. The flower bearers were: Messrs.
