George Sproule, Brampton

Lacrosse Player Dies

Was First Winner of Murphy Trophy as Most Valuable and Gentlemanly Player—Well Known in Georgetown and District

The death occurred Monday afternoon at Toronto General Hospital while undergoing an operation of George Sproule, aged 45, of Brampton. For many years he was a well known lacrosse player in Georgetown and known to sport fans in Georgetown and district.

In his boyhood, Sproule started his career with the Brampton Lacrosse Club in 1905, and until 1912 three years service, and, as far as is known, always the captain.

In 1913 he was the manager and played a few games, but unfortunately was unable to accompany his teammates to New Westminster, where they won the Mann cup in a series of three games.

The previous season the late Mr. Sproule was awarded the Jimmy Murphy Trophy, given to the best and most gentlemanly lacrosse player in Ontario by the Ontario Lacrosse Association. This was indeed tribute to a man who had been in there, game after game, for twenty years.

During his career Sproule figured prominently in the winning of four titles for Brampton, in 1914, 1916, 1918 and 1921. He started as a centre forward, and later became a right wing. It is doubtful if through his long colour in big-time amateur lacrosse George Sproule ever had an enemy. He died in his sleep.

He is survived by his widow and three daughters, Mrs. M. Hunter, Ainslie, Yorkville, N.Y.; Mrs. L. Muller, Ainslie, Yorkville; and Mrs. G. Williams, 212 Bloor Street, Toronto.

Services were held at the home on Friday afternoon, and burial took place at Glen Williams cemetery on Saturday, July 15th. The Rev. Mr. John Williams conducted the services at the grave.
