

### A Few Words to You About the C.N.R.

During 1934 the average number of persons employed by Canadian National Railways was 74,774, and the wages paid those came to almost one hundred million dollars. This represents, both as to number employed and amount of payroll, an advance over 1933, and practically the whole increase in personnel was due to re-employment of those whose services had previously been displaced owing to lack of business.

The average mileage of road operated in 1934 was 23,676 miles, making Canadian National Railways the largest single railway system in the Western Hemisphere.

In 1934 the total freight transported by Canadian National Railways amounted to 44,710,477 tons, an increase of eighteen per cent over the previous year. The average load of freight was 426 miles. The volume of this freight is not measurable, but it must run into many hundreds of millions of dollars, and, comprising all kinds of necessities and luxuries, contributed to the welfare and happiness of every man, woman and child in the Dominion.

Canadian National Railways carried over 10,000,000 passengers during 1934. This was also an increase over 1933. There was an increase of 16,591,399, or an average of \$1.02 per passenger with an average journey of seven-and-a-half to eight-quarter miles.

**IF THE HOOK CATCHES YOUR HANDS**

In checking over your tackle box in readiness for the fishing season be sure you have included a pair of small pliers or nippers capable of cutting the barb off a hook.

If you are unfortunate enough to bury the point of a hook in the flesh of your hand or some other part of your person, or if an accident of that kind happens to someone else in your party, you will bless the day you bought the pliers.

On a fishing trip, remote from medical aid, there is often only one way to remove a fish hook from the flesh and this same way is usually best under any circumstances.

First cut the hook free from the line or leader. Then force it on through the flesh until the barb emerges. This sounds like Spartan treatment but it is easier and far less painful than trying to work the barb back or cut it out.

Once the barb is through, cut it off with the pliers. The shank can then be removed with no difficulty at all. Treat the wound with iodine or mercurochrome and there is little danger it will give you trouble.

**THE FARMER KNEW**

A story is told by the Implement & Machinery Review (Georgetown) of two railway officials who were puzzled by the fact that a local farmer never took a railway ticket when he went to the neighboring market but always handed the cash to one of them.

These men were brothers and were the general factotums of the depot which was of the way-side, little used kind, but at last they approached the farmer to learn why he persisted in handing the money to them instead of buying a ticket in the orthodox way. The reply was: "Years ago I lost a cow on the railway and never got my money back, so I would not take a penny more never get another penny from me—and I know they never shall while you're here."

### Health from the Garden

The average garden supplies vegetables in abundance, perfectly fresh through the summer months, and all to be had which are easily stored for use or canned for winter use.

Comparatively few persons are afflicted with various ailments such as iron, calcium, phosphorus, iodine, sulphur which neutralize the acid condition of the blood. Iron is a very important element in nature provides them in vegetables, spinach, chard, lettuce, celery, tomatoes, carrots, cabbage, string beans, beets, parsnips, potatoes, radishes, onions, cucumbers, eggplants, turnips, peas and cauliflower all have varying amounts of available mineral matter. Leaf and stem vegetables are richer in calcium. Green vegetables are best sources of iron.

Vitamins essential to health, and necessary for growth and protection from disease. Deficient vitamins are found in various foods. Most are usually served raw, such as lettuce, cabbage and tomatoes are valuable sources of vitamins. Iron is present in all others.

Search and sugar are found in potatoes, parsnips, carrots, corn, peas and beans, and supply food for body heat and energy. Legumes (tripe beans and lentils) contain nitrogen and are rich in vitamins. Another important function of vegetables is to supply fibrous material. This is not digestible, but it adds bulk to roughage and aids elimination.

Points to be considered in cooking vegetables are preservation of colour, flavour and nutrients. Most vegetables are cooked in the same way, water boiling when vegetable is put in the pot. Keep it boiling, not simmering and keep closely covered. Salt added during cooking preserves colour. Baking without the addition of water is best in some cases, but it is not practical for many vegetables. To prevent strong flavours as in those of the cabbage family or onions, use a large amount of water in the covered vessel and boil for the shortest possible time for tenderness.

Points to be considered in serving vegetables from day to day aids in appealing to the appetite.

**BID YOU EVER STOP TO THINK?**

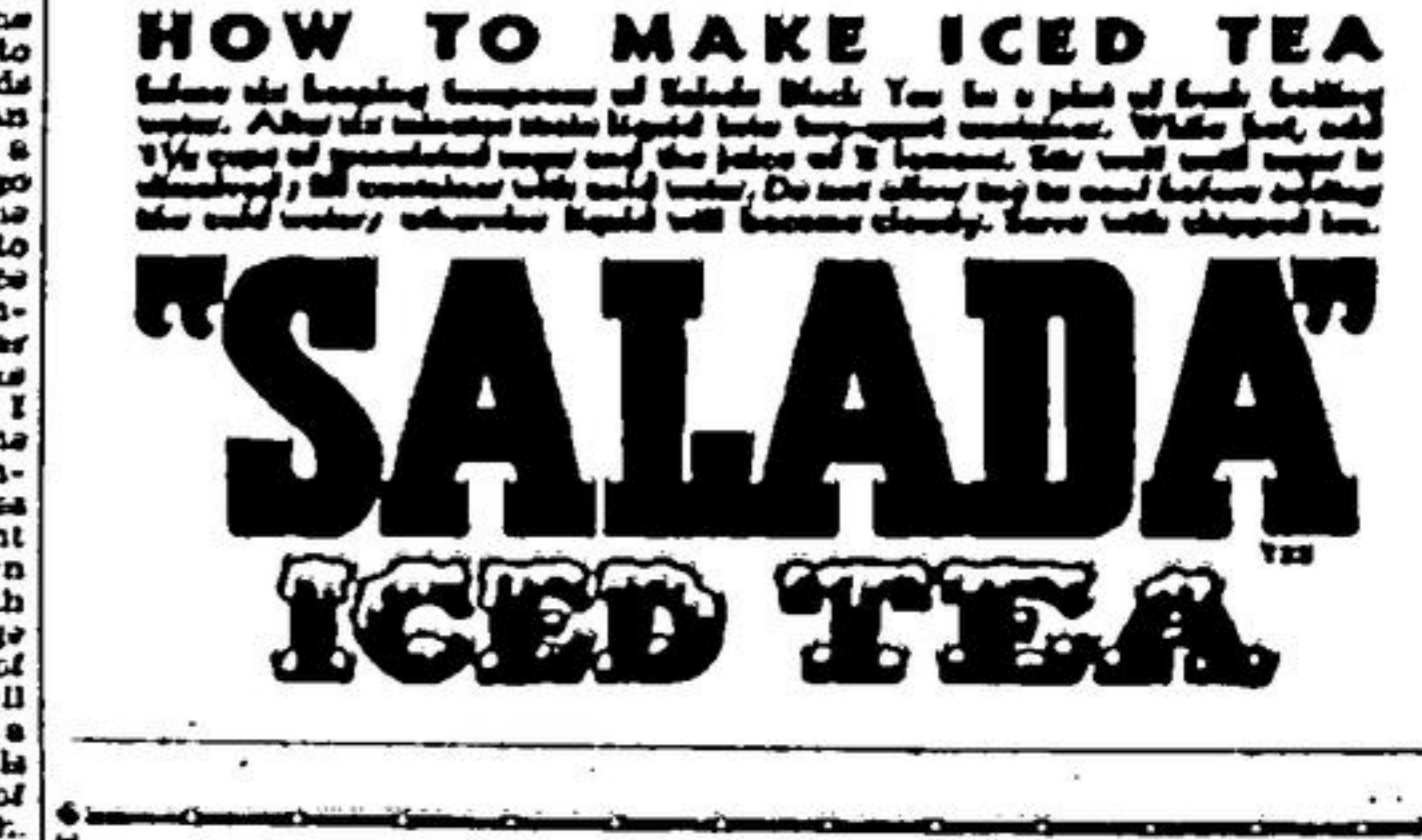
