The position can be understood by examining concrete examples. Thus, a merchant borrowing in the ordinary course of business might reasonably be expected to pay interest to his bank on an amount of his annual turnover, but to a corporation which requires funds to build or equip a factory or to a government which needs money to build roads, wharves or public buildings, the borrowing is a bond, representing a total cost which is only expected to be amortized over a long period of years. In other words, the merchant's borrowing is a loan, but the government's borrowing is a loan which is only expected to be amortized over a long period of years.

It is possible that the average rate of interest in Canada may rise somewhat further, but only inasmuch as the movement as far as banks are concerned has gone as far as is necessary to give the proper stimulus to orderly recovery. Present or lower rates of interest on long term borrowings will do little or nothing to help the banks to invest their funds, as on the confidence of the investing public in economic and financial policies of government.

THE CRADLE OF CANADA'S NATIONHOOD

Valcartier as "the cradle of Canada's nationhood" is the estimation of the late Archdeacon (Lieut.-Col.) P. O. Booth, O.M.C., D.S.O., of Quebec City, senior chaplain of the First Canadian Division, C.E.F. Recently as the guest of the war veterans and the city of Verdun, Que., Archdeacon Booth delivered an address which carries a message for all veterans of the Dominion.

"Today, we have difficult times, but Canada is not alone in this respect," he declared. "We know there has been hardship of all sorts in high places, that money has been drained by governments, and that suffering has resulted. We must regain the right spirit—the spirit that was in the hearts of the Canadian soldiers during the Great War."

The speaker thought that the element that made Canada a nation existed in the country today, that the same spirit that animated the men who went overseas was still present, and that all that was needed to make it felt was a union of the scattered forces. He liked to look back on Valcartier as "the cradle of Canada's nationhood."

"To those returned men who have faced discouragement and unemploy-

ment during recent years, the Archdeacon addressed a special message. "Hold your heads high although circumstances are against you," he said. "Life may be hard but there is no reason for shame. Say to yourselves: 'I can bear these days until better times come.' Exhibit the same courage in the face of overwhelming odds as you did in wartime."

With unflagging energy the "Beloved Padre" has travelled to widely scattered points during the past summer addressing veterans' reunion gatherings, including among others the Nova Scotia re-union at Hildesley and the recent tremendously successful event at Perry Sound, Ont. In his journeys he passed at Toronto and learned with evident delight of the organization developments arising from the great Canadian Corps Re-union there a year ago—Canadian Veterans.

Engineer From Rocky Mountains Becomes Deputy Minister of Interior

Keen outdoor man, enthusiastic member, and a leading stalwart of the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies, and a leading stalwart of the Trail Riders of the Canadian Rockies, J. M. Wardle, chief engineer, National Parks of Canada, has been well deserved promotion to the post of deputy minister of the Department of the Interior at Ottawa.

Although only in his "forties," Mr. Wardle has been rated as one of the most efficient officers of the Department of the Interior for many years. He was born in Chilliwack, British Columbia, on June 24th, 1888, receiving his education at New Westminster, B.C., and at the University of Kingston, where he graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Science. Mr. Wardle joined the Department of the Interior in 1913, and was appointed Superintendent of Banff National Park in 1918, continuing in that office until 1920, when he was transferred to Ottawa as engineer in charge of National Parks construction. He was given the post of chief engineer in 1925.

An expert on mountain highway construction, Mr. Wardle has supervised the building of practically all main highways in the National Parks of Canada. Under his direction the Banff-Windermere highway, the first motor road across the Central Rockies, was completed in 1925, and in 1927 the road known as the Kicking Horse Trail, from Lake Louise, Alberta, to the British Columbia, was also completed. He has supervised the building of the East-West Big Bend highway along the Columbia River from Donald, B.C., to Boat Encampment, and recently was placed in charge of the construction of the "west loop" from Revelstoke, B.C., north to Boat Encampment. This highway when completed will form the first link in the waterless system of the trans-Canada highway.

The latest highway project to come under his supervision was the road now under construction from Lake Louise to Jasper, Alberta. Mr. Wardle has also had charge of all other construction work in the National Parks. He takes over his new duties with the best wishes of his many friends in the Rockies, and, indeed, throughout Canada.
