## TOWN COUNCIL

RECEIVED FROM MCCANNAN  
STATE—COTTONER RELIEF COST  
ESTATE—MUNICIPAL ELECTION OF  
PEOPLE APPOINTED—ACCOUNTS  
PAID

Council met on Tuesday evening with Mayor Blackburn in the chair. Messrs. Owen and Coulter, Mr. Paul, Mrs. Davis, Mr. McEachern, Mr. Armstrong, Mr. V. Smith and A. McHugh present.

Minutes of previous meetings were read and approved. Davis and Blackburn were elected.

Mr. Robert Coulter addressed Council asking for permission to use town hall for gymnasium club.

Mr. H. McHugh added Council for use of town hall for Boy Scout meeting.

Permission to use hall was granted to the three deputations for their different organizations, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Guides and the Young Men's Christian Association.

Mr. McHugh said the hall would be available to the public should it be needed for concerts or other meetings.

Minutes were read from Canadian Corps Association in observance of Remembrance Day, Nov. 11; Canadian Legion, Post 120, required for donation to Poppy Fund. Ontario Dept. of Education, Mr. T. J. McHugh, re-election of posts on Arbitration Com.; Deputy Minister of Health and Hospital; re-indigent patient; Provincial Budget Add. to the amount of \$100,000 due to town from McNaughton Estate; Ontario Hydro Electric Power Commission; suburban right of way purchased by town for \$1,000.

Mr. McHugh, seconded by Smith that the Bell Telephone be permitted to erect telephone poles on Arden St. as per plan submitted. Motion carried.

Moved by Purdy, seconded by Cleave that the sum of \$600 received from the McNaughton Estate be paid by the Treasurer to the Tax Collector — Council.

Moved by Smith, seconded by Blackburn that the Treasurer pay the Mayor Compensation, the sum of \$100,000.

Moved by Smith, seconded by Purdy that we accept the offer of \$4000 for lots 23 and 24, Water Street, made by Mr. Young, to be paid to the town for the transfer — Carried.

A petition was presented by Councillor W. V. Smith, signed by business men on Main St., asking Council to install new lighting system on Main St.

## OBITUARY

**HAZELTON R. HALE**

A respected resident of Georgetown for many years in the person of Hazelton R. Hale, died at his home, 100 Argyle St., on Nov. 4th in his 80th year after a long illness. Mr. Hale, born in Brampton, son of the late John Hale, had a service record of nearly thirty years with the C.I.A. and for twenty years had been section foreman in the Georgetown district. Five years ago he suffered a serious accident, and his health was never quite the same. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church of the Orange Order, and of the Georgetown Prepository of Black Knights. Mr. Hale, a life-long Conservative in politics, is survived by his widow, formerly Miss Elsie Hale, two daughters, Mrs. Arthur Norton of Glen Williams, and Mrs. Frank of Toronto, and five sons, George, Gordon of Acton, Clarence Toronto, and Bert and Thomas at home. The funeral took place from his home, conducted by Rev. Mr. Macmillan of Norval Presbyterian Church. The pallbearers were C. W. G. Thompson, Mr. Collier, Mr. J. A. Kirby, G. G. Davis, Albert Took. Interment took place in Greenwood Cemetery.
