Made Partiese Without Aid of Pick and Shovel-and Last Them.

In 1889, when hundreds packed their picks and placer pans in answer to the Klondike lever which swept North America. Peter Kern went to Chicago. bought \$12,000 worth al diamonds and ahipped for Alaska.

Canada stands second only to the United
States it, telephone wire mileage per 100
inhabitants. Residents of cities or towns
less than 50,000 population, it is claimed,
are better equipped with telephones and
their associated apparatus than are the
inhabitants of most of Europe's important
and largest centres. Canadians make more
use of the telephone than any other people.
