The lady might hear you. ing the 1034-35 winter under the Dominion Lamb Pecding Project are placing increased repeat orders, in many cases asking for double the number of lambs they fed a year ago. The applications, particularly from Quebec and Ontario, reflect the abundunt supplies of hay, grain, sliage, and other crops in Eastern Canada.

Electric Rall Heating Electric soil heating for the propagation of seeds and promoting plant rowth is making headway in Canada. Nearly 300 installations are now being used in the province of Ontario in greenhouses, and in hotbeds and cold frames, for propagating the uveds of tomators, cabbage, cauliflower egg plant, peppers, cucumbers, melons. certain flowers, rooting cuttings of flowers, overgreens and sprouting sweet potatoes. The results of electric soil heating are stated to be very satisfactory. In the Burlington dis-trict the use of under-soil electric heating hastens the development of plants to set out in the field by about three weeks, and the growers report that freedom from worry when the weather changes is one of the distinct advantages of the system. Plants have much greater root development, shorter and thicker stems, and are generally more rugged. Durout in the field had less wilt and made quick recovery from it.


