Erna's Mission to Jerusalem
International Uniforms Sunday School Lesson, December 1st, 1935

GOLDEN TEXT: "The hand of our God is upon all them for good that seek him." Ezra 8: 22

LESSON PARAGRAPH: Ezra 7: 6-10; 31-29, 31, 32.

Oh, let each of us beware how his thoughts and motives bear! Every road that we shall choose. Other pilgrims feet will use. Some will follow where we lead. Long as life shapes his indeed. Erna has a brother's care and pray God to mark thy road each day.

International Contests.
Erna was a leader because he had had experience in Babylon before undertaking his work in Jerusalem. Experience in other lands broadens the mind and furnishes examples as to methods. Moses owed much to his wide experience before becoming the leader of his people. Karl Marx lived for a time in Britain. Lenin and Stalin both made visits to other lands. British statesmen feel it to be part of their education to visit the Colonies, while the Prince of Wales is one of the most widely travelled men now living. Bonar Law, an English political leader, was born in Canada. The present Premier of the Dominion of Canada worked for several years in the United States. General of the Premier of the Western provinces in Canada formerly lived in the East. Great religious leaders such as Gandhi of India, Kropotkin of Japan, or Koo of China have been great travellers and students of conditions in other lands. One of the few good results of war is the knowledge of other countries which is gained. The Christian Church has been greatly enriched mentally and spiritually by having missionaries in many lands.

Leader and Led, 7-10
Erna was a scribe but he was also a practical man of affairs. He organized his expedition thoroughly before starting out. The caravan route required a journey. Erna was leading a party of many different trades and interests, but he was able to infuse all with his spirit. Patriotism and gain were the chief purposes. Erna felt that he was being helped by a power greater than himself, and the God he detected in Ezra's songs of praise leading. "The good hand of God's leader," "The good hand of God's spirit upon the spirit of Erna," "The good hand of God's aid upon his shoulder. Erna's policy was very comprehensive. He desired, first of all, to know God's law, then to do

it himself and to teach it to others. This sums up the procedure that is wise in both education and religion. We must try to discover the law of God. DAMAGE BY MOTHS CAN BE HEAVY IN WINTER
Under the impression that moths commit their depredations in the spring and summer months only, many people display little care in putting away their summer clothes for the winter. As a matter of fact, moths may be found in heated modern buildings all the year round. Prevention is better than cure; therefore it is necessary to use the same care in packing up summer clothing in the fall as is bestowed on winter clothes in the spring. Moths themselves do no harm, except that they lay eggs, and when the eggs hatch into larvae, or caterpillars, feeding on other fabric damage commences at once. As the young larvae are very sensitive to light, they seek out protected situations in the folds of furs or woollen garments, or in the interior of upholstered furniture. Summer garments before being laid by for the winter should be thoroughly brushed, beaten, and shaken, preferably in strong sunlight. If there are no air-tight trunks or chests handy, the clothing should be placed in cotton or paper bags, or in cardboard boxes sealed with strips of paper. As an alternative, the clothing should be wrapped in two thicknesses of strong wrapping paper, taking care that the edges are turned so that the moths cannot gain entrance. The control of moths which infest clothes is fully discussed in a circular prepared by the Entomological Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture.
