RIOT MACHINES AT FALL FAIR

Gaming devices and slot machines will be barred in future from all Ontario agricultural fairs under threat of cancellation, Hon. Duncan Marshall, Minister of Agriculture, said in a statement to the press during the Royal Winter Fair at Toronto.

The ban will go into effect next year irrespective of enabling terms in the Criminal Code, the minister said. He further intimated he would ask the federal government to amend the Criminal Code so the device would not be given the present privilege.

The ban will be effective on every fair, from the biggest to the smallest. Mr. Marshall stated enabling legislation was being sought in an amendment to be brought before the House at the coming session of the Provincial Agricultural Societies' Act.

The minister said he had watched the operation of one of the machines and was convinced the gambling devices were not in the best interests of agricultural exhibitions. He further said he had already been in touch with the Federal Minister of Agriculture on the question.

Haltom Live Stock Men Plan Winter Programme

Members of the Haltom Live Stock Improvement Association at their annual meeting held in Milton on Saturday, Nov. 30th, decided to continue the live stock programmes undertaken a year ago. Keyman and Harve and cattle owners generally are delighted at the results secured to date. According to Moseley Watson of Tisbury this is the only season that has not had to use some protection on the nose and jaw of my horse which in my opinion is a great advantage. The live stock programme made by practically each of the 60 farmers scattered over the county. Plans are now under way to conduct all horse owners during the next two weeks. BANQUETING THE BIRDS

BIRDS do not migrate so much on account of cold as because of the lessened food supply. Especially in this case with insectivorous birds, if food is offered to them early, they will remain through the winter, but after they have once left for warmer climes, they will not return until spring.

Often neighborhoods only a mile or two apart and with practically the same environment show a great difference in their bird population. One may have a large number of birds, while another may have only a few. This is due to the fact that in one place the birds are fed, while in another they are not.
