Sales of Dominion Stores Limited for the 12th period ended November 30th, 1935, were \$4,400,210. This compares with sales of \$1,360,422 for the corresponding period of 1934 and sales of \$1,363,833 for the immediately preceding period of 1935.

The number of stores operated during the period was 483 as against 497 during the corresponding period of 1934.
