Another Successful Ball  
The sixty-fifth annual ball of Georgetown Fire Brigade was held in the Arena last Friday night. Owing to the stormy weather the attendance was a little below the average, but the evening's program proved to be one of the best and most enjoyed. Johnny Walden and his seven-piece orchestra supplied the music and refreshments were served from a cafeteria adjoining the ball room.

**THE CARE OF PLANTS IN THE HOME**

All flowering plants should be kept from draughts and enjoy a moist, moderately warm atmosphere. Gas or furnace fumes soon destroy all living things. They should be given the required amount of water at the right times and drainage should be provided to take away the excess. Never allow the pots to stand in water, continually for the roots will soon begin to rot.  
Those which have an abundance of bloom will require large amounts of water, replenishing the moisture content of the plant lost through transpiration from leaves and flowers.  
Yellowing of the foliage is generally an indication of too much water, but this rarely occurs in the hot dry air of the average home. It more often shows the need of food or becomes dry. Azaleas in bloom, require a thorough soaking every day or two and must be kept moist. They enjoy a moderately warm, moist atmosphere and lots of light, but no direct sun.  
Cyclamen should be allowed to get fairly dry before being watered, and kept in a cool, sunny window, away from draughts.  
Begonias are tender and succulent, and are at their best in a warm, sunlit room where the air is kept moist by steam from the kettle. They should be watered when they show signs of drying out. Begonias shrink from a cold draught coming in the door and shrivel up in the blast from the hot air register. They, too, like the winter sunlight.  
Ferns will thrive in any warm, bright room with little attention. Except watering when they become dry. At long intervals of two months or so, they will require repotting or spraying with insecticide to prevent the attack of insects and scale. The necessity for this can be seen by examining the plant closely every week or two.  
Those who follow these simple rules will be rewarded with many months of enjoyment from their house plants.
