The Georgetown Hockey Club has produced two excellent teams this winter, and if they continue to play the brand of hockey they have this far, hockey fans can look forward to some play-off games here this winter.

Both Intermediate and Juniors clubs have been well to the fore, with the Juniors leading their group, not having lost a game, while the Intermediates are on even grounds at the top of the league with Bolton.

The Intermediates suffered their first defeat of the season at the hands of Bolton here on Monday night, when the score was 4 to 2. While the local team was on the small end of the score, they put up a remarkable game, and it was only sheer luck that they did not score closer.

Bolton, also, have a smart team, that will take some beating, but Hall in the net was the stumbling block on Monday night. Bolton scored once in the first period, and at the end of the second frame it was 4-0 for the visitors. Georgetown came out in the third period with a hard task before them, but they did well and succeeded in reducing the score by two goals. The Oakville boys took the lead in the first period, when they scored two goals inside the first five minutes of play. Georgetown scored once, and at the end of this frame the score stood Oakville 2, Georgetown 1.

In the second period they kept the score tied, and scored three to the Villians one. They notched their fifth counter in the final period, to make the score 5-3 at the end of the game.

Inaugural Meeting of Georgetown Council

Opened with Scripture Reading and Prayer—Mayor Joseph Gibbons Entertains Members of Council, Town Clergy and Town Officials at Dinner—Committees Appointed

Georgetown Council elect for 1938 held its inaugural meeting in the Council chamber on Monday. The following members were present: Mayor Joseph Gibbons, Rev. George Davis, Councilors A. E. Cripps, Thomas Lyons, Joseph Hall, James Costigan, N. H. Brown and W. T. Smith. Also the following members of the local clergy: Rev. F. C. Overend, United Church; Rev. D. D. Davidson, Presbyterian Church; Rev. W. J. O. Thompson, Anglican Church, and Rev. E. G. Baxter of the Baptist Church.

After the declaration of office and the reading by Town Clerk Harrison had been subscribed to by the members of Council, on request of Mayor Gibbons, the devotional part of the meeting was left in the hands of the ministers.

After reading the 13th chapter of Paul's letter to the Romans, Rev. F. C. Overend led in prayer, asking God's guidance in municipal and town affairs generally.

Mayor Gibbons thanked the clergy for their assistance at this the inaugural meeting of 1938 Town Council, after which he read the following address:

To the members of Council and citizens of Georgetown:

Having subscribed to my declaration of office for the year 1938, it is a pleasure to know that in transacting public business I will be associated with many of my former colleagues. Rev. Davis, Mr. Costigan, Mr. Hall, Mr. Cripps and Mr. Lyons, all of whom I am convinced will renew their efforts in the interests of good municipal government.

I take this opportunity to publicly congratulate Mr. Brown and Mr. Smith on their election to the municipal council, and I believe that they are conscious of the responsibilities which are theirs, and they will be worthy representatives for the wards in which they have been elected.

One of the outstanding features in the community of the past year was the celebration of the 100 years of existence and progress of the Town of Georgetown. Although very little public money was available for this purpose, the citizens were given at intervals throughout the year, the opportunity to meet and greet their friends, and to renew and maintain friendships that were established many years ago. Much credit is due Col. Jas. Ballantine, the general chairman for the time and thought he gave in organizing and carrying through to such a successful conclusion these activities, and I know that he appreciates the assistance and co-operation he received from the members of his committee.

Reviewing the financial situation of the past year it is pleasing to know that the collection of revenue, although the uncollected taxes are still a serious problem. With a total levy of approximately \$65,000, 77% was collected last year. The total arrears at the 31st of December, 1937, was \$41,555.00. The amount of unpaid taxes do not only interfere with all departments of civic service, but also keeps the tax-rate higher by several mills than it otherwise would be.

In appealing to the members of the council for their co-operation, may I suggest to the chairman of the various committees to seriously consider the money available when making their requisitions, may I remind the members of the council and all citizens interested in civic advancement that it was by the curtailment of unnecessary expenditures by the members of this council and councils of recent years, rather than any increase in revenue, that has established the financial soundness of the Town of Georgetown a situation which is maintained.

OWING to the bad condition of the roads and considering the large expenditure for the maintenance and protection from dust, you will be asked in the near future to consider a hard surface road building program. If started this year it may be carried on and completed by future councils.

It is my intention at the next regular meeting of the council to submit for your approval a by-law to issue debentures for approximately \$15,000.00 for the payment of the housing loan of the municipality. We have in the past been having 5 per cent to the Province on this loan which involved a levy of 2 mills, whereby we may now, with the consent of the department of municipal affairs issue debentures bearing 3 1/2% thereby not only creating a saving of 1 1/2% to the municipality, but also simplifies the cleaning up of this long outstanding financial burden to the taxpayer.

In transacting public business during the year, I naturally do not expect we will at all times agree on problems pertaining to municipal government and different opinions freely expressed and providing we have respect for the opinions of others frequently assist in arriving at the best possible conclusions.

It is my desire to express my appreciation for the good-will the members of the council and citizens generally have extended to me in the past, and I welcome this opportunity to thank the people of Georgetown whom I am making a special effort

to successfully serve, and in return for that confidence and good-will I assure the citizens I shall render my efforts for greater achievements for civic welfare.

In conclusion I appeal to all the churches, industries, organizations and citizens generally for that continued splendid co-operation, so that by our united efforts we may confidently expect the year 1938 to be a year of happiness and prosperity for all the people of the Town of Georgetown.

The following committees were appointed for the year, the first named on each committee being chairman:

Finance—Hall, Cripps, Smith, Roads—Lyons, Davis, Brown, Waterworks and Fire Protection—Costigan, Hall, Brown, Welfare, Light and Police—Smith, Lyons, Cripps, Building and Property—Cripps, Davis, Costigan, Printing and Industrial—Brown, Smith, Lyons, On motion of Hall and Smith, a by-law to authorize the head and treasurer of the Town of Georgetown to borrow the sum of \$60,000 to meet current expenses until the 1938 taxes come in, was read the first time, and carried.

A second and third reading was given the above by-law and it was finally passed and the seal of the corporation attached thereto.

Moved by Davis, seconded by Lyons, that the regular meetings of Council for 1938 be held on the first Tuesday of each month.—Carried.

Council adjourned to meet on Thursday, Jan. 20th.

At the close of the meeting, the following were guests of Mayor Gibbons at a delicious dinner served at the Exchange Hotel, under the direction of Mrs. Wright, the proprietress: Councilors A. E. Cripps, Joseph Hall, Thomas Lyons, James Costigan, W. F. Smith, and N. H. Brown; Rev. F. C. Overend, Rev. D. D. Davidson, Rev. E. G. Baxter, Col. James Ballantine, Chief of Police W. G. Marshall, Town Clerk P. B. Harrison, Medical Officer of Health—Dr. C. V. Williams, and J. M. Moore. Rev. Mr. Thompson and Reeve Davis were unavoidably absent.

The dinner was quite informal and most enjoyable, the only toast being that to "The King," proposed by the Mayor, and responded to by the National Anthem.

Following the dinner a vote of thanks was moved by Rev. Mr. Overend and tendered to Mayor Gibbons for his kind hospitality.

The Mayor thanked Mr. Overend for his kind words and said that during his term of office he had appreciated very highly the co-operation of the clergy, medical health officer, town officials, Col. James Ballantine, for his splendid work in connection with the Centennial celebration, and the press in their efforts to assist the Council to make Georgetown one of the best towns in the province.

The singing of the Maple Leaf brought this very pleasant and happy gathering to a close.

At the inaugural session of the council on Monday, it was moved by A. Mason and seconded by E. Jones, and passed unanimously, that C. F. Leatherland be appointed Clerk and Treasurer of the Village of Acton, and that the Clerk prepare a by-law to be presented at the next regular meeting of the council. The salary to be \$50 per annum.

Few arenas have the same splendid co-operation that Acton Citizens Band gives here. It certainly adds to the game and has always been appreciated.
