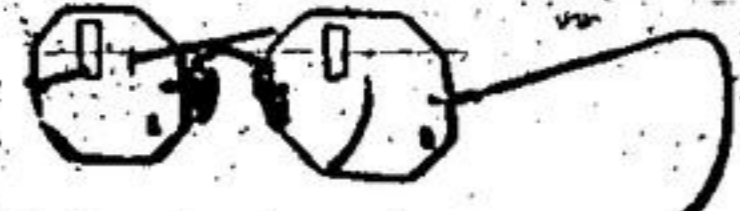

### FORMER HALTONIANS CELEBRATED SIXTY-FIFTH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

#### HUGH FALCONER

Hugh Falconer, prominent for 30 years in the public life of Dufferin county and a former magistrate, died Wednesday of last week. Born in Scotland 31 years ago, he came to Canada in 1872, settling in Teeswater. He moved to Shelburne, where he lived for 47 years, then to Orangeville, remaining there until 1925. For 30 years he was a member of Dufferin county council, being chosen as warden in 1917, after filling the offices of councillor, deputy-reeve, and reeve his own municipality. He later was elected magistrate in Orangeville for 10 years, and was also treasurer of the Division court. Almost up to the time of his death he was active in real estate business in Mount Denison. He is survived by his wife and two sons, Fairbairn, Toronto, and two daughters, Mrs. Vera Craven, Jacksonville, Florida, and Mrs. John Falconer, California.

### HOLSTEIN BREEDERS ANNUAL MEETING LARGELY ATTENDED

The annual meeting of the Halton Holstein Breeders was held at Palermo on Saturday, Jan. 8th, with approximately 100 breeders in attendance. A new innovation was attempted by the club in holding their business session in the morning, dinner was supplied by the ladies under the convener'ship of Mrs. V. J. Lawrence, followed by the programme in the afternoon. The attendance and general interest indicated the general approval of the breeders of the county. The afternoon programme included two of the most outstanding addresses ever delivered to a farm audience in this county, according to many of the breeders present. Geo. M. Clemens, secretary of the Holstein Friesian association of Canada, gave a most interesting illustrated travelogue of his recent trip to the British Isles, Holland, France and Switzerland. In his address Mr. Clemens dealt with agricultural conditions with particular reference to the breeding of Holstein cattle.

Dr. W. R. Graham, who was introduced by Byron Jenver, Holstein Fieldman for Western Ontario, was referred to as an illustrious son of an illustrious father. Dr. Graham gave a most illuminating address on "Factors other than breeding, influencing the dairy cow's efficiency." ### MILTON SHORT COURSES HAVE REOPENED

The Three Month School in Agriculture and Home Economics reopened at Milton on January 4th, with most of the regular students in attendance and a few new enrolments. In the course in Home Economics, aside from the regular course in foods and cooking, Miss Grace Hamilton is the special instructor on Health Education which includes Nursing and first aid.

In the young men's class, special attention has been given during the past few weeks to Farm Mechanics, gas engines and tractors, under the direction of Mr. J. H. Shaw of Hepler. This feature has created a great deal of interest and the students are most enthusiastic.

On Tuesday, Jan. 18th, Prof. E. C. Stillwell of Guelph was the special speaker on the subject of Farm Meats.

We understand that plans are also under way for the members of the two classes to pay a visit to various industrial plants in the city of Toronto to-day.
